LOCAL MATTERS.

WEATHER PROBABILITIES.—For this section, snow or rain tonight and probably Tuesday; fresh northerly winds, becoming brisk on the coast.

DEATH OF DR. DIENELT.—The many friends and acquaintances of Dr. Julius Dienelt were startled yesterday on hearing of his death which occurred at his home on south Columbus street in the morning. He had been confined to his home for a few days from an attack of grip, which, it was hoped, would soon pass off, but later pneumonia was manifested and his condition became critical. He lingered until yesterday morning, his strength gradually waning, until death closed the scene. Dr. Dienelt was born in Brunswick, Germany, nearly 73 years ago, and came to the United States when young. He located in Philadelphia, where he studied dentistry and later came to Alexandria about 45 years ago and began the practice of his profession on the west side of Royal street, between Prince and Duke. Later he moved on north Washington street, and for many years was one of the prominent dentists of Alexandria. During the latter part of his life he relinquished his profession and engaged in other occupations and at the time of his death he was bookkeeper for the Alexandria Steam Bread Bakery. He was an educated gentleman, quiet and methodical in his deportment, and was much respected by all who knew him. He leaves a widow and seven grown children—three sons and four daughters, his being the first death which has occurred in the family.

FUNKRALE.—The remains of Mr. Edwin Bohraus, who died in Philadelphia on Saturday last, were brought to his home in this city that night. The Relief Hook and Ladder Fire Company held a meeting yesterday afternoon to take action regarding the death of Mr. Bohraus, who was a member of that company. A committee was appointed to draft suitable resolutions, which was done. The company's house was ordered to be draped. The company decided to postpone the banquet which it was intended to hold February 22, until April. The funeral took place at the residence of his mother, this evening at 8 o'clock. The services were conducted by Rev. M. L. Leucke, of the Lutheran Church, and the pallbearers were Messrs W. L. Hoy, A. W. Melchior and Thomas B. Power, of the Relief Company, and Messrs. Philip Diddoneit, Robert Grimes and Ernest Deahl. The Relief Company and delegates from the other fire companies attended the funeral. The floral tributes were beautiful and in the greatest profusion.

Mrs. Minnie E. Keniston, daughter of the late David and Martha Johnston, died in Baltimore on Saturday night, in the sixtieth year of her age. The remains were brought here today and interred in Bethel cemetery, the services being conducted by Rev. C. E. Ball, of Grace Church.

LUSUS NATURAE.—A colored woman named Lucinda Pye, living on Pitt street, near Gibbon, was filled with apprehension this morning when she went to her chicken house and found a human face in bas relief on the shell. She picked it up and ignoring further household duties proceeded to show it to all who would look at it. Some told her it was a bad omen, that such an egg, especially if laid by a black hen (as was the case in this instance) indicated that the owner of the fowl would become a victim of night-dowlers, while others were sure she would be ridden by witches before morning. The place on the egg seems to be a cross between a circus clown and some of the campaign cartoons of William Jennings Bryan, and it is supposed the hen must have seen one or the other.

VEEPER SERVICES.—Arrangements have been nearly perfected for the solemn vesper services in St. Mary's Catholic Church next Sunday night. The services will be under the auspices of Fitzgerald Council, Knights of Columbus. Rev. Charles W. Carrier, of Washington, will deliver the sermon. The choir will consist of members from the local council, together with a large number of Washington knights. An elaborate musical programme has been arranged for the occasion. The choir will hold a rehearsal tonight and the final rehearsal will be held Thursday evening.

A VISITING PYTHIAN.—Past Grand Chancellor Leonard Marbury, of Oriental No. 6, Alexandria, Virginia, was present Monday evening at the meeting of Gamecock Lodge K. of P. and the members were very much pleased to meet him. Mr. Marbury is a prominent lawyer of Alexandria, and has been spending the winter in Sumter for his health. Besides his prominence in Pythianism he is a Mason of high degree and is much esteemed in both orders.
