### "KING OF DUKES" ARRESTED.—James Waldere Kirk, formerly known as the "Chicago King of Dukes," was a prisoner in the West Side Police Court in New York yesterday on the charge of intoxication. Kirk was attired in a fat-colored automobile coat, with fedora and gloves to match.

Magistrate Meade scratched the pen across the affidavit and said "Discharged." Kirk unbuttoned his overcoat in order to display a black suit of 12-gilt-tweed, across the waistcoat of which was strung a gold chain, on each end of which was attached a gold watch, studded with all manner of stones. From the chain hung a gold locket, larger than a silver dollar, with the monogram design J. W. K., the initials of his name, set in diamonds. Carelessly enough he drew from his pocket a chain, upon which hung rings with various kinds of settings. Besides these jewels already enumerated, he displayed stickpins without number and uncut opals to the number of 31.

### MORMONS GOING TO MEXICO.—Dr. H. F. Gray of Los Angeles, Cal., has purchased 5,000,000 acres of agricultural lands in Mexico, and has obtained a concession from the Mexican government for the establishment of a number of Mormon colonies thereon. These lands are divided several large tracts which are situated in the States of Sonora, Tamaulipas, Coahuila and Vera Cruz. He says that he will bring 6,000 Mormons from Utah and other parts of the United States to Mexico within the next few months and locate them upon the lands which he has purchased. The Mormon colonies in the State of Chihuahua have had their population increased by the arrival of over two thousand Mormons from Utah during the past few months. It is asserted that polygamy is openly practiced by these colonies, and that it is sanctioned by the Mexican government authorities.

### ORANGE CROP IS ENORMOUS.—Officials of the Santa Fe Railroad in Chicago confirm reports from California that millions of dollars worth of oranges in that State are rotting in the packing houses and on the grounds of the groves because of lack of transportation facilities to move the enormous crop. According to W. B. Jason, assistant to President Ripley, the trouble is not entirely due to a dearth of cars. "The railroads," he said, "have moved out of southern California 50 per cent more oranges than at this time in previous years. The crop is enormous, and owing to the way it ripened it is extremely delicate and will not last through the season. In fact, it is my belief that the orange growers who have already marketed a large crop will save money if they let the remainder rot on the ground."

### LITTLE GIRL ACCUSED OF MURDER.

A sensational murder case is in the County Court of Greene county, which has brought in an indictment against Lucretia McDaniel, a fifteen-year-old girl for the murder of her ten-year-old schoolmate, Dora Shifflett. The alleged murder took place in a lonely mountain schoolhouse on Swift Run Gap near E. Kro. The two children reached the building before the other pupils had made a fire. Either on account of a grudge or a quarrel the McDaniel girl set fire to a broom and deliberately held it under the smaller child's clothes until she was a mass of flames. The defense claims that the burning was accidental. There were no other witnesses than the two girls, the other pupils arriving only to find the Shifflett girl enduring great agonies.
