

### THE QUEEN'S CHARACTER.

A dispatch from London says, Queen Victoria was at once the best known and least known of sovereigns. Her subjects understood her because she was never out of touch with them, but trusted them as they trusted her. Her real character and manner of speech and life were not known, because there could be no intrusion upon the privacy of a sovereign so sincerely honored. Biographies of the Queen were either made up of anecdotes told at second or third hand by people who knew nothing about her, or were official records submitted for her revision that was critical or independent in judgment.

"The Quarterly Review," which under the able editorship of Mr. Prothero has regained its old time character and prestige, contains a remarkable article on the Queen, evidently written from a precise and intimate knowledge during a period of fifty years. The article is not signed, but it occupies a leading place in the current number, and is, perhaps, the first character study of the Queen made by any competent writer who had the advantage of personal acquaintance with her, and could reproduce her own words in daily conversation and form impartial and critical judgments, based on prolonged observation and reflection.

The article is discriminating, while eulogistic, and is remarkable for the candor of its statements, its independence of judgment and even the severity of its criticism. It throws a new light upon many secret passages in the history of the reign, and contains a series of facts and anecdotes illustrating the Queen's characteristic traits of humor and racy talk, and has throughout a strong note of personality. The authorship of this great article will probably remain a literary secret, and will pique public curiosity.

The author attempts, without blind or sycophantic laudation, to ascertain what were the elements and processes of the evolution of the Queen's character. He finds few traces of heredity, but that she was rather an ordinary mortal with fine instincts, considerable mental capacity and a certain vital persistence which served her well, and that qualities not in themselves extraordinary were trained by circumstances so as to provide a basis upon which an excellence not innate could be built up.

The explanation given of the Queen's prejudice against Mr. Gladstone is that it started in the suspicion that he gave her too much work to do, until she was, as she put it, "dead beat." He tried in his eagerness to press her to do what she considered her work, and when she resented it and he renewed the attempt, she formed a pertinacious prejudice against him which never was removed. The author states that it was always an element in her reticence with regard to Mr. Gladstone that he was too High Church and had the mind of a Jesuit.

The Queen's own attitude toward religion is discussed judiciously. The headship of the Anglican Church or the Scotch Presbyterianism she considered to be a part of the business of statecraft, and did not trouble her conscience about it. Probably the form of service which she preferred was that of the Presbyterian Church, but she was a Broad Church woman, with no curiosity about creeds. She liked Roman Catholics much better than Anglican ritualists, but possibly because she felt no responsibility for their opinions. The article closes with this remarkable sentence: "And gradually she hypothesized public imagination so that at last in defiance of theories, historians, philosophers and the nation accepted the Queen's view of her own functions, and tacitly concluded with her that she ruled a consecrated monarch by right divine."
