LOCAL MATTERS.
On his usual morning at 4:55 a. m. and left at 6:55 p. m. High water at 7:30 a. m. and 7:55 p. m.

WEATHER PROBABILITIES.—For this section, partly cloudy tonight, high temperature, Friday fair and warmer; light southerly winds.

PICKED UP IN THE STREET.—A white man giving his name as William McDuffey, and claiming to come from Richmond, who had been making himself conspicuous on the street in the afternoon, was picked up shortly before 8 o'clock last night in a dazed condition by Joseph Williams, watchman at the Fertilizer works. Williams found the man standing near the Standard Oil Works in the northeastern section of the city. McDuffey who was well dressed, was unable to give any account of himself. Williams, with much difficulty, conveyed the man to the police station. He was placed in a cell and Dr. Miller, was summoned. He found that the man was apparently under the influence of some drug and he ordered that he be taken to the L. Pharmacy for treatment. The police were under the impression that he had taken laudanum. McDuffey had been drinking, but he had not taken any drug. He is employed by William Ray, on North Royal street, as an upholsterer.

ILLNESS OF A FORMER ALEXANDRIAN.—Captain John W. Jett, a former resident of this city, but who in recent years has lived in Washington, is extremely ill at his home in that city, and his decease is momentarily expected. He has reached his 80th year. Captain Jett will be remembered by all old Alexandrians as the pilot of the Washington ferry steamer George Page in by-gone years. The boat was at that time owned and piloted by the late Sunday in the city. The boat was taken over by Captain Jett and she was painted black and converted into a Confederate gunboat. She was destroyed when the Potomac batteries were abandoned by the Confederates, and her ribs are now surmaged in one of the lower creeks.

CRANK SHAFT BROKEN.—The Washington police boat Vigilant was disabled yesterday morning by the breaking of the crank shaft. Harbormaster Sutton, who was on duty at the Georgetown channel about 9 o'clock and had nearly reached the Long bridge when the accident occurred. After drifting for a short time the boat was taken in tow by the tug Lily and Howard and carried to her moorings at the Seventh street wharf. It will require about a month to repair the boat, and it is believed that the new engine for the boat will be ready to be installed by that time, or shortly afterward, it is doubtful if the repairs will be undertaken. Harbormaster Sutton will use the steam launch Allie Moore, of this city, temporarily.

THE CONFEDERATE MONUMENT.—The work of improving the site of the Confederate monument at the intersection of Prince and Washington streets has been about completed, and the block, now the most beautiful in the city, occasions no little pride to every Alexandrian. The monument is surrounded by a grass plot, enclosed by granite curbing, on which are situated pedestals for gas lamps. Outside of the curbing the site is paved with vitrified brick. Special exercises will occur at this place on the 24th instant—Confederate Memorial Day. The entire work reflects much credit upon all who have prosecuted it, as everything has been done in the most approved and careful manner. The designer of the improvement was City Engineer Holcombe.

FUNERALS.—The funeral of the late Richard I. Ratcliffe, whose death this occurred Monday night, took place this afternoon at 4 o'clock from the residence of Mr. Richard H. Warder, on Upper King street. The services were conducted by Rev. J. A. Jeffers, of Trinity M. E. Church, and the pallbearers were six nephews of the deceased. The funeral of the infant daughter of Mr. Charles Reynolds took place from its parents' residence, on Upper King street, this morning at 10 o'clock.

INJURED BY A FALLING TREE.—Mark Johnson, a son of Benjamin Johnson, a prominent farmer of this county, lies at his home with his eyesight almost destroyed and both ankles broken by a tree which was being cut down by a colored man falling on him. The accident occurred a day or two ago while Johnson and a companion were driving in a buggy near "Ghosts' Hollow," on the Georgetown and Leesburg pike. This is said to be the third person injured in the county recently by falling trees.

NE SUTHER ULTRA CREDIDAM.—On North Asaph street there is an unpretentious sign, "Watson Green, shoemaker." Green will be remembered as a preacher and active politician in Alexandria for the past few years, but, according to the sign referred to, he has settled down to first principles, and is now ready to "half-sole-and-heel with neatness and dispatch."

FISH.—A fisher at Fishtown was unchanged this morning. Fish were still in light receipt, and people from the lower river report the fishery as about at an end in that locality. Up the river, however, the catch is more satisfactory. Wholesale prices are: Shad \$8 a 12 per hundred, and herring \$2 a 250 per thousand.

WINDOW BROKEN.—Some vandals, supposed to be a drunken man, broke in the show window of Mr. Charles Ward's store, on Columbus street opposite the old court house, about one o'clock this morning. Nothing was stolen, but the family was aroused and they were compelled to take all articles from the window and improvise some mode of protection until today.

Mr. Dave Makoley, who fell from a street car in Washington last Saturday night, was brought to his home in this city yesterday evening. He is rapidly recovering from his injuries.

THE OLD DOMINION GLASS COMPANY is pushing work on their new works near the outlet lock of the old Alexandria canal, and in a short time that locality, which has so long remained quiet, will once more present scenes of animation to those of coal shipping days. The establishment of the plant, which is in the hands of practical men, will doubtless attract to the contemplated manufacturing to our river front, which presents every advantage claimed by other cities. There is no good reason why the entire stretch of shore on this side of the river from a point opposite Georgetown to Jones' Point should not team with enterprises of some sort. There is a bold river front within easy reach of railroads, and the Old Dominion Glass Works may be the nucleus of many more which will be brought here.

WILL GO TO NORFOLK.—Mr. John F. Tackett, who for a number of years past has conducted business in this city, has determined to remove to Norfolk, where he has become one of the firm of Russell, Simcoe and Tackett. The business of Tackett & Marshall in this city will be continued, but Mr. Tackett will be compelled to give most of his personal attention to the Norfolk house. During Mr. Tackett's residence in Alexandria he has become one of our most prominent, enterprising and popular citizens, and while all wish him abundant success wherever his lot may be cast, it is to be regretted by his many friends and acquaintances that circumstances render it necessary for him to leave our midst where he had become in a measure one of us, sharing our joys and disappointments in laboring to build up our city.

DEATH OF MR. W. F. CRIGHTON.—The many friends of Mr. W. F. Crighton will regret to learn that that gentleman's death occurred at his home, on South Pitt street, about four o'clock this afternoon. The deceased had been in feeble health for some time, having been a sufferer from chronic kidney trouble. Mr. Crighton was the oldest son of the late John T. Crighton, and in early life was a clerk in the late Mr. Henry Cook's drug store. Later he was associated with his father in the hardware business. For a number of years previous to his death he had with Mr. Frank Warfield conducted the drug business at the northwest corner of King and Royal streets. He leaves a widow and three grown children—two sons and one daughter.

CASE DISMISSED.—The only case before Mayor Simpson this morning was that of Robert Jackson, colored, who was charged with threatening to shoot Henry Washington, also colored. Washington charged Jackson with having his razor in his possession, and, according to his version, when he demanded it Jackson drew a pistol and threatened to shoot him. The Mayor found nothing in the evidence of a serious nature as to warrant the complaint, and dismissed the case. The trouble occurred in what is known as Dulany court in the northwest section of the city.

Cole, whose critical illness has been mentioned, had not materially improved today, although he was resting more easily. Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Rice and the Misses Paulling have arrived in Warrenton and have taken board with Mrs. Fort. J. D. Normley has gone to New York to spend a week with his brother.

FIRE COMPANY MEETING.—The monthly meeting of the Columbia fire company was held last night. One member was elected and one application for membership received. An invitation from the Westminster, Md., fire department to attend the annual session of the Maryland volunteer firemen was received and a committee was appointed to ascertain how many of the company would attend.

THE WEATHER.—The fair and warm weather of the past few days was succeeded yesterday evening by a stiff easterly wind and lower temperature. The heavens became hazy and there was every indication of the approach of a rainy period. The same threatening conditions prevailed this morning but later in the day the sky cleared.

FORTY HOURS' DEVOTION.—In the account published yesterday of the forty hours' devotion to be held at St. Mary's Church it was stated that the services will begin on Sunday. In the Corporation Court today Mr. B. B. Smith was appointed administrator of the estate of Antonio Caldwell, colored, deceased.

Mr. J. B. Bill entertained the Congressional Enclave Club at his residence, on Duke street, last night. A number of prizes were awarded.
