LOCAL MATTERS.

Rises tomorrow at 4:30 a. m. and sets at 7:13 p. m. High water at 11:34 a. m. and 12:10 p. m.

WEATHER PROBABILITIES.—For this section cloudy tonight and Thursday with occasional rains; fresh to brisk east to south-east wind.

ELECTION TOMORROW.—The general election for city officers will take place in this city tomorrow. The final arrangements will be made tonight. As has been stated, there are but two candidates in the field apart from those nominated at the democratic primary on the 16th of April—Jos. S. Beach, Mayorial candidate, and Frank Evans, candidate for the Common Council in the Fourth ward. The following will be the official ticket:

DEMOCRATIC COMMITTEE.—A called meeting of the City Democratic Committee was held yesterday evening at the office of the secretary, Mr. G. L. Boothe. There were present Mr. O. F. Carter, chairman; Mr. Boothe, secretary, and Messrs. Price and Penn, besides several candidates whose names are on the ticket to be voted for tomorrow. There was a general interchange of views concerning the election and all present expressed a willingness to assist in bringing out the vote tomorrow.

Mr. Boothe said there were indications that a large vote would be polled and that it was the duty of each member of the committee to assist in getting out the democratic voters.

All thought there was no doubt of the election of the entire ticket. Mr. Carter said it was reported on the street that some members of the committee would not only vote, but work against a part of the ticket. He had hoped all the members would be present that they might put the direct question to each of them as to the truth of the report.

A committee was appointed to secure subscriptions from the candidates to defray the expenses of the election, and the chairman and secretary were requested to prepare an address calling on the democratic voters to go to the polls tomorrow and support the ticket nominated at the recent primary.

TEACHERS' EXAMINATION.—The examinations for teachers in the public schools will be held this year by city superintendent Kemper.

For white teachers, at Peabody Building—Tuesday, May 28, and Wednesday, May 29.

For colored teachers, at Hollowell Building—Thursday, May 30, and Friday, May 31.

The examination will embrace orthography, reading, writing, arithmetic, grammar, geography, history, physiology, and hygiene; and for first and second grade certificates civil government and the theory and practice of teaching also.

In conformity with the requirements of the regulations, an examination of applicants (white) for professional certificates and life diplomas will be held at Stanton, Manassas, and Marion, and of colored applicants at Hampton, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday, July 17, 18 and 19.

DEATH OF MR. KIDWELL.—Mr. Chas. Kidwell, a well-known resident of the First ward, died at his home, on south Fairfax street, shortly after seven o'clock last night. The deceased was about 60 years old. He was born in Fairfax county, but came to this city over a quarter of a century ago. For several years he was engineer at the shipyard, and later was employed at the Vulcanizing Works, foot of Water street. Recently he filled a position at one of the brick yards in the county. Mr. Kidwell had been in failing health for a long time. He had had a stroke for a long time, from the effects of which he never recuperated. Mr. Kidwell leaves a widow, sister of the late Thos. Berry.

FLAG SOCIAL.—Class number 18 of the Methodist Protestant Church Sunday school last night gave a flag social in that church. The social was quite largely attended and proved a success. An interesting musical and literary programme was rendered, after which refreshments were served. Among the decorations was a flag that floated over the U. S. cruiser Montgomery during the Spanish war. The proceeds of the entertainment will be used for the Foreign Missionary Society.

POLICE COURT.—The following cases were disposed of today: Robert Brooks, colored, charged with assault on Henry Munson, was dismissed. Enoch Davis, charged with assault and beating James Lloyd, was dismissed. Charles Jackson, colored, charged with being disorderly and fighting, forfeited \$2.50. Night Report.—Last night was cloudy and cool. One prisoner and three lodgers were at the station house.

RIVER NOTES.—The prevailing easterly winds caused a high tide last night and again this morning. At eleven o'clock the water in some instances had reached sidewalks on the Strand. At the Washington Ferry Company's wharf it stretched from pavement to pavement and half submerged the cannon planted on corners. Should the wind hold from the east damage may be apprehended, or the tides will make higher and higher every twenty-four hours.

There is but little doing on the river, and apart from the arrival and departure of small river craft there were no changes to note this morning.

The schooner Centennial, loaded with lumber by H. K. Field & Co., for St. George's Island, sailed.

The United States dispatch boat Dolphin passed up the river to Washington shortly before 11 o'clock.

The schooner Winnie H. Windsor and slop Ethel, loaded with bricks, are at DeW. Altheosen's wharf.

The Norfolk steamer Washington, due here at 6 o'clock this morning did not appear until 1:15. She had been detained by heavy weather and did not stop here, but proceeded to Washington.

RECEPTION.—A very large audience assembled at the M. E. Church South last night and participated in the cordial welcoming to the pastor, Rev. E. V. Regeater, upon his return to Alexandria station and also Rev. Dr. Duffey, the recently appointed presiding elder of this district. A very fine and interesting programme was rendered during the evening, led by Mr. Henry K. Field, and consisted as follows: Opening, singing of doxology by audience; prayer; instrumental duet, Mrs. Nellie Warfield and Miss Lulu Cockey; vocal solo, Miss Lucy Graves; recitation, Miss Nina Tanne; instrumental solo, Mr. Samuel Wade; male quartet, by Messrs. Kennedy, Sullivan, Lambert and Slanmaker; vocal solo, Mr. Mills. The address of welcome to the presiding elder and pastor was delivered by Mr. E. B. Kemp and was responded to by Rev. Mr. Duffey and Rev. Mr. Regeater. The room was very tastefully decorated and all present expressed themselves as having spent a pleasant evening. After a hearty hand shake the audience was dismissed at 10 o'clock.

FIRE AT ROSSLYN.—The stable attached to the Rosslyn Packing Company's establishment at Rosslyn, in Alexandria county, was destroyed by fire last night. The building proper was but slightly damaged, although it looked at one time as though a wholesale conflagration was imminent. The Consumer's Brewery is in close proximity and much apprehension for its safety was shown. It, however, also escaped with slight damage. Some engines from Washington went to the rescue and a large number of people from that city went to the scene. Mr. Robert W. Cline, engineer of the packing company, discovered the fire, and with others worked heroically to save the horses and hogs. Twelve of the former were rescued and about one hundred of the latter. The loss is between \$5,000 and \$6,000, covered by insurance.

THE WEATHER remains in statu quo—cloudy, rainy and threatening with an easterly wind. This morning there were indications of a disagreeable southeaster. A cloud of mist extended over the Maryland hills as far as the eye could reach, while the wind blew strong from that direction. Later a fine penetrating rain set in, while the wind ever and anon came in heavy flurries. Around the river front it was next to impossible to use an umbrella, as the southeast wind occasionally struggled for its possession. The river presented one unbroken scene—white-caps chasing each other—while the waters surged and penetrated higher and higher and dashed against the planking of the wharves. Vessels scudded up and down with reefed sails and bonnets out of their ribs. The rain is much wanted, and the temperature having rose its fructifying influence is specially welcome.

RUNAWAY.—People who visited Mount Vernon yesterday witnessed a thrilling scene in the grounds caused by the stampeding of the horses attached to the conveyance in which passengers who arrive by the boat are conveyed to the mansion. The horses became frightened from some cause and rushed pell mell through the grounds carrying the vehicle with them. In their flight they collided with the iron gates at the north entrance and completely demolished them. Strange to say, the animals sustained no material injury, nor was any person hurt.

FIGHT.—Passengers who arrived here on the six o'clock ferry boat yesterday evening, as well as many others who were in the neighborhood at the time, witnessed a vicious fight between two negroes on Union street, near King. One of the darkeys was beaten up considerably. Both were arrested. This morning the Mayor dismissed the delinquents, it appearing that the one who came out second best was the aggressor.

EXAMINATION.—The examiners recently appointed to conduct an examination of applicants for the position of Superintendent of Gas are engaged in their work in the Council chamber this evening. The only three applicants are, as stated yesterday, Messrs. F. M. Latham and Harry Hantzman, of this city, and Mr. O. F. Smith, of Washington. The result of the examination will not be officially made known for some days.
