LOCAL MATTERS.

San rises tomorrow at 4:33 a. m. and sets at 7:26 p. m. High water at 4:05 a. m. and 4:33 p. m.

WEATHER PROBABILITIES.—For this section generally fair tonight. Thursday fair, except probably showers in the afternoon or at night; continued high temperature; variable winds.

AVERTING REMOVAL.—Several members of the Relief Hook and Ladder Company were in the City Hall last night for the purpose of protesting against the adoption of the report of the committee on public property recommending an appropriation of \$1,025 for the purchase of a lot on the west side of Royal street, between Cameron and Queen, for a new truck house for the company. The report when submitted was laid on the table. As has been stated, the unanimous desire of the company is that Council will purchase the lot east of the present house on Prince street which extends to an alley running through the square through which there is a sewer and where everything will be more convenient. Besides they urge that the truck should not be located any farther north in the city, as property in the southeastern section would in such an event be in a measure unprotected. Most of the members, it is alleged, live in close proximity to the present house and in a case of fire are in position to quickly procure extinguishers and prevent what might result in disastrous conflagrations.

RIVER NOTES.—Captain Addie Posey has been transferred from the steamer Kent to the steamer Wakefield as pilot, succeeding Captain Bailey Reed, transferred to the command of the steamer Arrowhead.

The dredging machine Fannie, belonging to Mr. John Miller, is on the ways at the shipyard. The dredge is to be given an overhauling, and, when again launched, it is stated, she will be in fine order.

The dredging of the shoals of Indian Head, under the supervision of the United States engineers, in order to obtain a uniform depth of twenty-four feet of water at low tide, is now nearly completed. For some time past the big dredge Alabama has been engaged in leveling the bottom of the ridges left by the dredge last season.

WANT THE IMPROVEMENTS.—As was anticipated by the Gazette, the threat for vitrified brick work is apparent here for the square on King street, between Fairfax and Royal, has been completed. Property-owners on the two squares east running to Union street last night petitioned the City Council for similar work under the terms of the 333 section of the city charter. A petition was also submitted by Mrs. C. L. Leadbeater for a continuation of the new curbing on King street and the paving of the gutter with vitrified brick south on Fairfax street in front of her property; also for catch basins to connect with the sewer. The petitions were referred to the committee on streets.

DEPARTURE OF THE COLUMBIA COMPANY.—About forty members of the Columbia Fire Company and fourteen of the Drum Corps, all in uniform, left here at 8 o'clock this morning via the Washington-Southern Railway for Westminster, Md., for the purpose of participating in the parade attending the meeting of the Maryland State Firemen's Association which takes place this afternoon at 2 o'clock. The company arrived at their destination accompanied them, and a large crowd gathered at the house and depot to see the company off.

CRUISE OF LOAFERS.—Wm. Geary and James Richards were before the Mayor this morning, the former for trespassing on the City Hotel property and the latter for being drunk on the streets. Geary was fined \$5 and Richards was dismissed. In examining the case the Mayor had his attention called to the number of idle persons who loiter on north Royal street, sitting in the shade of houses and often making themselves obnoxious to passersby, especially ladies. His honor signified his intention of effectually stopping the practice by putting into operation the vagrant act.

POLICE COURT.—The following cases were disposed of today: James Richards, drunk in the street, detained. Wm. Geary, trespassing on the City Hotel property, fined \$5. Eugene Anderson, colored, larceny of three yards of silk from Mrs. Herbert, was dismissed. Jennie Johnson and Hattie Nelson, disorderly and fighting, fined \$2.50 each.

EXTRA ALLOWANCE.—The petition of Mr. George W. Pettey, Chief Engineer of the Fire Department, asking Council for an allowance of \$120 per annum for the maintenance of a horse and wagon to be used at fires, met with a quick response. An ordinance was introduced last night and passed by both boards which makes the allowance asked. There is a proviso in the ordinance which sets forth that whenever the team shall cease to be used the extra appropriation will cease.

JIM CROW CARS.—The movement introduced in Council some time ago to compel the electric railway company to provide Jim Crow cars on all trains passing through this city has proven abortive, from the fact that the State law provides for such coaches only on steam roads. A member of the Common Council made inquiry last night concerning the ordinance and was answered in substance as stated above.

A HOT WAVE.—The weather during the past two days has been intensely hot and the coalman is again in evidence. The mercury in the thermometer at noon registered 86°. The sun's rays were piercing, and protracted walks were prostrating.

The remains of the late Charles Perkins, who died in Washington Monday night, will be brought here tomorrow for interment.

Improvements expected to cost not less than \$200,000 are to be begun at Providence Hospital building, in Washington, at once.

Mr. Leo Wheat, the well-known pianist, has been placed in the Washington Asylum Hospital for treatment for shattered constitution.

Mrs. Myers, who some time since came here from near Occoquan and whose husband, it is said, has deserted her, was today sent to the infirmary.

A deed was recorded today from D. P. Hurley conveying a house and lot on the west side of Washington street, between Duke and Wolfe, to J. T. Myers.

Marriage licenses were issued in Washington yesterday to Sis Dangerfield Butcher, of Rosslyn, and Lillie Diggs, of Georgetown, and to Arthur Lee Wilson, of Lynchburg, and Elmer Wilson.

All the curbing on King street between Fairfax and Royal, has been placed in position, and the work of concreting the gutters has been commenced. Laying of vitrified brick will follow in short order.

The testing of steam pumps at the Emerson Works, foot of Prince street, was continued today. Several pumps which had been brought for use in Mexico gold mines were tested in the presence of the purchasers. All worked satisfactorily.

TO-DAY'S TELEGRAPHIC NEWS

The State Convention. Richmond, June 12.—The constitutional convention was plunged into a debate lasting two hours before it was permanently organized. The question was whether or not the delegates should take the oath prescribed in the Underwood constitution. Men of giant intellect spoke on each side. The body refused to take the oath. Hon. John Goode was elected president and Jos. Button secretary. Governor Tyler addressed the convention, after which an adjournment was taken. The committees will be appointed next week and then the convention will get down to business. There is much talk of the convention going to Charlottesville to hold its sessions.

Foreign News. London, June 12.—Truth today announces that King Edward's coronation will probably take place on June 25, 1902.

London, June 12.—The Imperial Cup of 400 sovereigns at Lingfield, Park, today was won by Richard Croker's bay horse Flambard, with Lester Reiff up.

London, June 12.—Rev. Wm. Booth, General of the Salvation Army, fails to return to London on account of illness. The General is in a serious condition.

Glasgow, June 12.—The celebration of the 45th anniversary of the foundation of Glasgow University began today. Delegates are present from universities in Massachusetts, California, Montreal, Toronto, Calcutta, and elsewhere.

Vienna, June 12.—A dam which protected the village of Nanders, Tyrol, from the high level of a lake outside of the place was burst today by a storm and the water rushed down, drowning 29 persons and sweeping 16 houses before it.

Mont De Marsan, France, June 12.—A peasant woman at this place has given birth to a monstrosity in the form of a four-legged, four-armed, one-headed child.

Manila, June 12.—Capt. Wm. E. Wilhelm, 21st infantry, died today from wounds received in a battle at Lips several days ago.

Paris, June 12.—The engagement has been announced of Count Boni de Castellane's brother Stanislaus to the daughter of Emilio Terry, the Cuban millionaire.

London, June 12.—King Edward officiated at an impressive ceremony this morning, attended by civil and military notables, his Majesty presented 3,000 medals to British soldiers for gallant conduct. The King gave each medal personally, thus prolonging the ceremony for three hours. An immense crowd witnessed the presentations. Earl Roberts was the first to receive a medal and Lord Milner of Cape Town was second.

Kiel, June 12.—During the launching of the battleship Germania today a yard crane collapsed, killing two workmen and seriously injuring three others.

London, June 12.—Statistics printed today show an 8 per cent death rate among the Boer refugees at the Pretoria race course, which has been used as a refugee camp for about a year. The number of refugees at the camp is 3,125, showing the death rate to be 435 per thousand annually.

Discord in the Convention. Philadelphia, June 12.—The Southern Industrial Convention has caused his public spirited promoters something of a shock.

In spite of the high sounding platitudes indulged in by both sides in the cordial and untroubled yesterday, the dominant note at the opening of today's session was one of discord.

The first trouble developed at last evening's session when Robert C. Ozden, of this city, spoke of "Popular education, the power of industrial progress." Delegates took umbrage at this reference to the poor, illiterate white women of the South, whom, he stated, required education as much, if not more than the negro.

The threatened discussion was prevented by President Hargrove, who said that Mr. Ozden must have been mistaken. At this morning's session, however, Mr. Hargrove, who hails from Shreveport, La., and is editor of the New Orleans Picayune, got back at Mr. Ozden in a speech which reflected severely on Philadelphia.

"For the first time," he said, to the forty persons present, "I feel misgivings as to the success of this convention. There was a good start made, but I fear a bad ending. We of the South are familiar with New York, Baltimore and Boston, but we know nothing of Philadelphia. Why we never see a traveling man from Philadelphia in the South. We know nothing of your goods. You make no attempt to get our business. Send your commercial agents down so that the real commerce may grow up. That would be better than talking so much and doing nothing. I see few Philadelphians here this morning. What new faces are in the hall are new arrivals from the South."

Charges Bad Faith. Madrid, June 12.—Rifles Labres, the leader of the Cortes, has announced that he will move an amendment to the reply to the message of the throne. The amendment will state that America is not keeping the spirit of the treaty of Paris; that when Spain signed the treaty it was expected that the Americans would have special trade privileges in the West Indies and the Philippines which, by the treaty, Spain would share. The amendment will urge the government to secure these privileges for both Spaniards and Americans. Premier Sagasta has agreed to sound the powers to see if they will support Spain's protest against America's action in the matter.

Headless Body Identified. Lowell, Mass., June 12.—The woman murdered and decapitated somewhere in the vicinity of Chelmsford has been identified as Mrs. Fred. Blondin, of Boston. The head of the murdered woman was found yesterday afternoon. It was wrapped in an old skirt and had been sunk in a brook a short distance from the place where the body was found. The body had been weighted with a piece of granite. Presumably the woman was dead, or at least unconscious before decapitation. The police believe that it may be another such case as that of Jennie Boschieter.

A Big Coal Transaction. Philadelphia, June 12.—A \$33,000,000 transaction covering the purchase and transfer of the Berwyn-White coal company has been closed here. It is said that the purchase was made in the interest of the Pennsylvania Railroad Co. The property is distributed throughout eight counties of the state of Pennsylvania. The purchase is probably the largest single transaction in real estate in the record of Pennsylvania titles.

A Reaction. Havana, June 12.—Since the reception of Secretary Root's letter regarding the Platt amendment the sentiment among the delegates to the constitutional convention has undergone a change in favor of the measure. Many of them now express the hope that a resolution accepting the amendment will be passed this afternoon. The opposition is decidedly non-committal today.

Made Governor of Cavite. Manila, June 12.—General Mariano Trias, until recently a prominent leader in the rebellion has been made Governor of Cavite.

Washington, D. C. June 12.—In obtaining the Government of Cavite province General Trias gets just what he promised him more than a year ago if he would surrender. At the time he declined the offer in forming Aguinaldo of it. His final surrender preceded the surrender of Aguinaldo by only a few days. Next to Aguinaldo and Malina, Trias was the most influential of the insurgent leaders.

TELEGRAPHIC BREVITIES. A woman styling herself an occult scientist fired a bullet at an agent of the Charity Organization Society in New York yesterday. He wrested the weapon from her after a struggle; she then smashed his office windows with an axe.

The great running stallion Halma, owned by Julius Fleischmann, Mayor of Cincinnati, has been sold to a European for something like \$30,000. It is believed that the purchaser is Jean de Rozke, the famous tenor, and that Halma is destined for service in De Rozke's stud in Poland.

The Imperial Council of the Mystic Shrine was in executive session in Kansas City, Mo., today. The competitive drill of the Arab Patrols was the feature of the afternoon. The Imperial ball at Convention Hall tonight, closes the convention. San Francisco was selected as the place for the next meeting.

Mary Rider, the colored servant, who has been suspected of the murder of Mrs. Sarah Hagenbush in Philadelphia, and who has been under arrest, this morning when brought into court charged John Hagenbush, son of the deceased, with the murder. The accused trembled violently and seemed in imminent danger of collapse when brought into the presence of the girl. He was locked up.
