TO RESTORE THE PARTHENON.

The desire of the Greek government to restore the Parthenon does not excite enthusiasm among the possessors of its looted treasures, says the New York Journal. According to a Paris dispatch to the Journal "there is laughter in artistic circles over the suggestion from Athens that the foreign governments having fragments of the Parthenon and Erechtem return them, so that they may be placed in their original positions." The attempt at restoration is denounced as "sacrilegious Philistinism."

Of course, if restoration means sticking blocks of glaring new white marble against the mellow ancient remains, and hiring modern sculptors to replace the lost masterpieces of Phidias, the project is justified. But there is a possible restoration quite consistent with a reverent regard for the priceless bequest of antiquity. If all the surviving fragments of the Parthenon's decorations were gathered up from the museum in which they now lie in pitiful mutilation, and were carefully put back into their original positions there would be no desecration, and the temple would recover a little more of its ancient beauty.

We must remember that the Parthenon did not become a ruin when the glory of Athens decayed. It saw the generation that built it die. Pericles and Phidias and Praxiteles disappeared. The fleets of Athens perished at Syracuse and Aegospotami; the City of the Violet Crown became the prey of Sparta and her Thirty Tyrants; the Long Walls were leveled, and still, in all her degradation and misery of the time, the Parthenon looked serenely down in unimpaired beauty. Then Athens rose again. Thrasybulus, Conon and Iphicrates gave her back some of her old fame in arms; Plato and Aristotle carried her philosophy to its highest pitch; Menander reached the climax of comedy and Demosthenes of eloquence. Then, under the respectful control of Macedonian and Roman overlords, she passed gradually into a decadent old age, until at last, after enduring wave after wave of barbarian invasion, she sank into the position of a miserable Turkish village. But through it all, for two thousand years, the Parthenon remained almost as perfect as when it left the hands of Ictinus and of Phidias. Not until New York was nearly eighty years old was the Parthenon shattered by a powder explosion in a war between the Turks and Venetians. And then, within the past hundred years, the sculptures that had been spared by time and war and thirty generations of barbarians were carried away for museum visitors to gaze at.

It seems as if modern artistic conscience might very well replace as far as possible what modern vandalism has ravaged.

KING EDWARD'S CORONATION.—Silently and secretly the preparations for the coronation of the King next year are being arranged by the Court officials, says London Sketch. It will be the most magnificent State ceremony ever witnessed in England, for it must be remembered that when Queen Victoria ascended the throne she was not Empress of India as well as Queen of Great Britain and Ireland. In the case of the King, who is also Emperor of India, the native princes of Hindustan will be bidden to the ceremony, and the presence of many colonial magnates. "When the magnitude of the programme is considered, a year seems almost too short a time for perfecting it," said a courier of high standing the other day. "The work is done in sections, and when every section is more or less perfect, the whole has to be dovetailed in symmetry. The undertaking is stupendous. I need scarcely say that the personal interest of the sovereign in the arrangements is great and constant."


