MR. BRYAN IN VIRGINIA.
Hon. William Jennings Bryan arrived at Newport News yesterday morning from Washington and lectured last night on "A Conquering Nation." He was introduced by Gov. Tyler, who went down from Richmond.
After a lecture a banquet, tended by the city democratic committee, was given at the Warwick in honor of the Nebraskaan, with the following toasts: "The United States," Col. Bryan; "Virginia," Gov. Tyler; "The City of the Ships," R. G. Bickford, D. G. Smith, of Newport News, officiated as toastmaster.

Mr. Bryan spent the day at Backrock Beach, the guest of the Newport News Railway and Electric Company, which placed the President's car at his disposal and tendered him all the courtesies of the hotel and road. In the morning he went fishing, catching one croaker. After a swim and lunch he went to Newport News, accompanied by a party of citizens who went down to meet him. In the course of an interview Mr. Bryan commented on the failure of the Seventh National Bank of New York.

"There is no good reason why a bank should fail if times are good," he said. "When prices fall rapidly banks are liable to fail. The failure of Mr. Heath's bank was doubtless due to mismanagement, but if the capital had been larger in proportion to deposits there would have been more margin between assets and liabilities."
Asked if he did not think his suggestion of Hanna for the republican Presidential nomination inconsistent with his third-term theories, Mr. Bryan said: "I would not be courteous to the President to suggest that Mr. Hanna has already had two terms. I do not think Mr. Hanna should be nominated, but I have said that I consider him the best representative of the republican policy."

Mr. Bryan talked freely on political questions. The democratic party, he said, was as strong and vital as it was eight years ago, and all that was needed for its success was the honest advocacy of democratic principles on all sides. His lecture last night was heard by a large and exceedingly enthusiastic audience.

KILLED BY LIGHTNING.
Huddled under Montrose Pier, a mile above the north end of Lincoln Park, Chicago, ten boys and one man were struck dead by lightning in a tornado which swept Lake View. A twelfth victim, a boy, was found alive under the pile of bodies. He was unconscious and badly burned, and is not expected to recover. This sole survivor is William Anderson. He regained consciousness at the hospital, but remained paralyzed from his hips down. He was so weak he could hardly talk, but he gave the names of two of the comrades who were killed.

The victims had been fishing and enjoying the cooling breezes and when the storm came up they got under the pier for safety. The lightning which caused the catastrophe burned out all the telephone wires in the vicinity and it was some time before the police arrived. The top of the pier was covered with zinc, one of the best conductors known, and the bolt of lightning tore it to pieces. Dr. Sawtelle, of the Marine Hospital, one of the first to arrive at the scene, in describing what he saw when he reached the pier, said the bodies were twisted together like so many worms or snakes, and every one of the eleven was dead when he reached them. The same bolt of lightning also struck an Evanston avenue car just as it was passing Buena Terrace, a short distance from the pier. It knocked the car from the track, turned it about and threw the passengers into a panic, besides burning out the motor. The conductor and the passengers all felt the shock more or less severely.


