### LETTER FROM ATLANTIC CITY.

(Correspondence of the Alexandria Gazette.) Atlantic City, N. J., July 27, 1901.


About two weeks ago your correspondent, almost overcome by the intense heat prevailing in Alexandria and the Theological Seminary determined to escape it by seeking the cool breeze and the refreshing surf at the above named national resort. The change experienced was most delightful. While we have read the accounts of the sultry humidity prevailing in your ancient town as chronicled day by day in the Gazette, we have been rejoicing in the breezes wafted in from the ocean tempering the attempts of old Sol to melt us. We are domiciled on Kentucky Avenue, near the famous board walk, and can soon enjoy the breeze by joining the throng on the wide promenade which overlooks the sea. The attractions of Atlantic City are too numerous to mention. First, of course, is the ocean. We may be seen in the attire suitable for wading the waves from about eleven a. m. till noon, and are not at all conspicuous amidst the multitudinous throng of bathers. Your correspondent made a mild suggestion that we get photographed in ocean attire as a memento of our visit, but was met by the prompt reply that there was no intention on another's part of being made a laughing stock for our friends who inhabit inland regions. On Saturdays and Sundays the throng of bathers is immense. It is sometimes impossible to get suits at the bath houses until the great morning and evening rush for the sea is over. I am indebted to you for giving us a description of the delights of an ocean plunge. That must be experienced to be appreciated. The next great object of interest is the boardwalk, already mentioned, lined on the land side with hotels and stores in which are displayed most tempting articles to catch the eye of the passer by, and last but not least the various places of amusement. Then on the other side of the board walk is the ocean and the piers which furnish a delightful resort for any time of day, but especially the night. The reasonable sum of ten cents admits each one to the several piers and in fact to most of the amusements of this city. The Steel Pier being the most recent of all the piers belonging to the city is the handsomest, and contains beside the arcade where the band daily gives sweet music, two large music and dance halls, one midway the pier and the other far out at the ocean end, where the waves keep time to the music and dance of the gay pleasure seekers. After supper or dinner as the case may be large numbers went their way to the piers. Most greet their visitor on entering, and he can take his choice of the numerous performances furnished nightly to suit all capacities and ages, from the antics of the clown up to the delightful concerts held in the great hall. Then when one becomes tired of the arts and amusements invented by man there is the unending pleasure which comes from sitting on the pier to enjoy the never-ceasing monotone of the sea and to breathe its invigorating air. A night or so ago we wandered up as far as Heinz pier, which the great pickle manufacturer has built for the exhibition of his goods and the pleasure of those who wish to inspect them. No admission is charged for entering. On the contrary you are presented with a small pickle—or a cracker buttered with caviar—or a reward for taking a long walk. But apart from the display of interest for this season is the fine historic painting of "Custer's Last Rally" by Mulvany. Custer and the remaining men of his brave three hundred, nobly meeting the desperate odds, occupy the centre of the picture, as the fierce overpowering army of the Sioux, half hidden by a cloud of dust, under the lead of their skillful chief Crazy Horses, surrounded, mowed down and totally destroyed the devoted band, knowing so well what the end must be. The painting is worthy of a place in some public gallery, but Mr. Heinz with commendable enterprise has purchased it for the benefit of his employees at the main manufactory situated in Pittsburg to which place it will be removed at an early date.

Near Heinz's pier is a branch of the first and only ostrich farm so far established in Florida. A number of birds are kept here and it is interesting to watch them. They are of all sizes and besides there are two nests full of eggs in process of hatching. We were told that the ostriches chose their partners for life at four years of age and by way of teaching this era a commendable lesson remain faithful to each other for 70 or more years. An interesting part of the show is the process of catching an ostrich and placing a colored bow in its nose as to enjoy a ride. From all appearances the visitors seemed to have more pleasure out of the ride than the boy. Attached to the enclosure is an office where ostrich bones, plumes, &c., are on exhibition and sale. We are informed that the farm started in Florida a twenty years ago has become quite a profitable investment.
