ANOTHER NEW FACTORY.—Alexandria is to have another manufacturing enterprise, plans having been formulated for its early erection at a hosiery factory on Wilkes street, between Pitt and St. Asaph. The site selected is that formerly occupied by what for years was known as the "New Foundry," which enterprise was short-lived and the building remained for many years a memento of by-gone days. It was erected some time in the early fifties—a time when the Smith & Perkins locomotive works were in full blast, when two shipyards were prosperous and employing many men, the Mount Vernon Cotton Factory in operation and the Alexandria Canal making a coal depot of this place. Railroads were being constructed and the city's tide was on a steady flow. The war, however, came on and the tide slackened, the ebb followed and the foundry and its ponderous cranes eventually became covered with cobwebs. The result used it for a stable and shortly after the war a bolt of lightning knocked out the east end. Later a cyclone formed near the building. It passed harmlessly over every other house, but gave the coup de grace to the foundry by completely destroying it. Bark was for a long time piled on the lot and until a day or two ago it was supposed it would never again be used for a building, certainly not for a manufactory. But the hum of machines was destined to be heard there again. And now for the particular scene of this prelude: The Alexandria Hosiery Company had been quietly organized with Mr. William Schwartzman as president, Mr. Arthur Schwartzman vice president, Mr. John S. Schwartzman treasurer, and Mr. Samuel Stokely general superintendent and secretary—all well-known and practical men, who have been eminently successful in other manufacturing branches in this community, and who understand every detail in connection with a hosiery factory. These gentlemen, in conjunction with other enterprising citizens who are doing all they can toward furthering the interests of the new company, for several days looked about the city for a suitable building for the plant. There were but few which in any way met the requirements, and these were beyond the reach of the company by reason of the price demanded. It was therefore determined to purchase a lot and erect thereon a building especially adapted to the wants of a hosiery factory. The foundry lot, which is one-third of a square, offered the most desirable accommodations. Light, a great desideratum in a factory, could be obtained from all sides and there would be plenty of room to enlarge when circumstances demanded it. An interview with Mr. Wm. E. Smoot, the owner, was sought and the projectors found in that gentleman an earnest sympathizer in the movement. The result was the consummation of the purchase of the property at a much lower sum than had been contemplated and on the most advantageous terms. The object of the company is to manufacture hosiery by the most improved machinery. The capital stock is to be \$10,000. Mr. P. M. Yost will be the foreman. A meeting of the company is to be held at once. It is expected that the building will be finished by October and about twenty-five hands will be put to work at first. Later a dye house will be erected on the southeast end of the lot, and as the business expands of course the necessary enlargements and new buildings will follow.
