LOCAL MATTERS.

Excitement Allaying.—The excitement manifested by a certain percentage of the community last Friday night is fading and will soon have subsided its course as something less than a nine days' wonder. Pett, the object of wrath, is safely encased in a steel cage at Fairfax Courthouse, sixteen miles away, where he is likely to remain until preparations for his trial are made. The Gazette yesterday said about all that could have been said concerning the matter. There was an aftermath last night which proved to be a temper in a teapot whose steam went to the almshouse, where they believed the prisoner was confined, and made a demonstration which rendered them laughing stocks. They were met by Mr. W. M. Smith, the jovial superintendent, who with a lantern conducted them through the building. About ten o'clock Lieut. Smith, of the police force, received information that a mob was forming at the Southern depot, and that official, accompanied by several officers, went to the scene of the disorder, but found only a crowd of young men and boys assembled, which he at once dispersed. Later it seems the same crowd reformed and walked out to the city almshouse with the result stated above. Word was received from Sheriff Gordon at Fairfax last night to the effect that he is ready to swear to a number of deputy sheriffs should occasion arise. This, it is not believed, will be necessary, so far as the people of this city are concerned, but it is understood that the sheriff is laboring under the impression that he may have trouble with the citizens of Fairfax who may contract the lynching fever. One of the officers who had charge of Pett at the examination at the almshouse yesterday morning says that the culprit broke down completely when confronted by Mrs. Payne. He fell to the floor and sobbed and moaned piteously, but made no coherent statements.

RIVER NOTES.—There was but little outside the ordinary to attract attention around the wharves this morning. The river boats had average complements of passengers and freight lists. There was more animation than usual at Messrs. W. A. Smoot & Co.'s wharves, about a dozen wagons being engaged in putting freight upon river boats. The steamer Tull was taking on a miscellaneous cargo for Occoquan and the steamer Lillian Howard was taking aboard a similar cargo for Aquia creek. The barge Seneca, with fertilizer from the Alexandria Fertilizer and Chemical Company, left for Seneca, and the barge W. A. Smoot, Jr., with fertilizer from the same company left for Hancock and Cumberland. The four-master schooner Malcolm Seely is still unloading phosphate rock. Other cargoes from Florida are expected shortly. The trade in this species of fertilizer has grown greatly in recent years, and is much more extensive than the Pennsylvania trade of Alexandria in ante bellum days.

ABANDONED HER BABY.—Virginia Smith, a comely young woman twenty-two years old, who admitted that she was unmarried, yesterday afternoon abandoned her infant baby, two weeks old, in a clump of bushes near Bethesda Park, Washington. The mother's instinct was too strong, however, and after leaving the child in a deserted spot, she left the car in which she sought the place where she had hidden the baby, and brought it back to the city, destitute and with no place to spend the night. She was sent to the House of Detention, where she will remain until some place is provided for her. The baby, a boy, was born two weeks ago in a hospital. After leaving the institution she endeavored to find some place where the child could be sheltered, but her search was unsuccessful, and toward evening she gave way entirely to despair which led her to abandon the child. Miss Smith said that she had no settled place of residence. She had gone about, she said, from place to place. She last lived in Alexandria.

Four persons and three lodgers were at the station house.

THE DREDGERS.—The work of dredging the shoals of the mouth of Mattawoman creek has been completed, and vessels drawing twenty-four feet of water can now pass over the flats at the ordinary low tides. The dredge Alabama, which has been working on the Mattawoman flats, has, with its scoops, been sent by Ritchhouse, Moore & Co., the contractors, to the Smith's Point shoals, off Somerset Beach, to aid the big dredge Pugh in deepening the water over the flats there. With the dredges at work it is expected the greater portion of the channel over the Maryland Point flats will be completed this season.

THE GLASS WORKS.—The first work on Saturday last started in the furnaces of the new glass works on the river shore in the northern part of the city, and work will be in readiness for the start and the managers report that they are receiving orders for goods already.

SUDDEN DEATH.—Mrs. Edward Quinn died suddenly at her residence, on Occoquan street, between St. Asaph and Pitt, shortly before seven o'clock this morning. The deceased leaves a husband and seven children—six sons and one daughter. Mrs. Quinn had been in feeble health recently, but her death was entirely unexpected, and was a severe shock to her family and friends and acquaintances. So sudden was the approach of death and so rapid its work that she expired before medical aid could reach her. The deceased was a lady much respected by all who knew. A kind and affectionate wife and a devoted mother, her death is a sad blow to her household, and the many friends of the family sincerely sympathize with each and every member in their sad bereavement. Mrs. Quinn was 60 years old. Arrangements for her funeral have not been perfected, but they will be announced tomorrow.

BOY RUN DOWN BY A CAR.—Marguerite Dent, aged eleven years, living on north Washington street, while riding a bicycle at the corner of Seventeenth street and Pennsylvania Avenue northwest Washington about 3:30 o'clock yesterday afternoon was knocked down by an electric car and injured about the head and face. He was taken to the Emergency Hospital and later was brought to Capt. Mushbach's residence, in this city, where he was attended by Dr. W. M. Smith, Dr. Carmichael, of the Emergency Hospital, and Mr. A. C. Murdaugh accompanied the boy to his home.

WASHBOUHS.—There were some serious washouts on the Southern Railway in the neighborhood of Lynchburg last night, and trains have been considerably delayed. North-bound trains due here early this morning did not pass through the city until nearly noon.

The electric light wire at the intersection of King and Payne streets broke last night and caused some apprehension to people in that locality until it was repaired.
