### PREPARING FOR FUTURE WAR.

The London Standard commenting on President McKinley's speech at the Pan-American Exposition, says it sees in it an expression of the fact that the United States is preparing for war in the future which will be commercial.

"The United States has become an imperial power, as the history of her diplomacy for years past conspicuously shows. It is imbued with an expansive, even aggressive, spirit. Headless of scruples at spreadeagles, the United States will go her way regardless of attempted combinations against her, such as sketched by Count Goluchowski, Austro-Hungarian Minister of Foreign Affairs, and with a certain carelessness whether or not comes a violent conflict with any European power." The Standard regards Mr. McKinley's reference to an intention to call an international conference to Great Britain that the Clayton-Bulwer treaty will have to be modified in some way, and it expects a formal pronouncement on the subject in the next presidential message to Congress. It declares that the matter cannot be settled without the concurrence of Great Britain.

Continuing the paper says that the Central and South American revolutions raise barriers to the enterprise of capitalists and the United States' policy of mediation in the present trouble is evidence that her diplomacy is directed toward clearing these away. The South American market is worth having. A power which asserted dominant political influence such as the United States is endeavoring to establish would obtain a great reward. The United States means to be that power, through the instrumentality of reciprocity treaties, subsidized steamships, and even of war against any European power which may challenge its pretensions to political supremacy. Referring briefly to pan-Americanism, the Standard remarks that Great Britain in both a North American and South American power. Holland and France are South American powers. It adds, Europe will never march out of America, North or South, at the bidding of the supporters of the Monroe doctrine. Pan-Americanism in its widest sense is an idle dream, but the aim of the United States to be the predominant political and commercial power is decided by the economic need of finding an outlet for her ever increasing surplus products. The necessity will press more heavily upon her as the years pass."

### DRANK POISON AT DINNER PARTY.

Resenting her husband's mild reproach at a dinner party, Mrs. Martha Peters of No. 264 west Ope Hundred and Sixteenth street, New York, drained a glass of poison Wednesday night and killed herself. It is believed, however, that her intention was merely to frighten her husband and their guests. Mrs. Peters was a Miss Donnelly, of Perth Amboy, N. J. About a year ago she met Albert E. Peters and they fell in love. Her family opposed the courtship and the young pair eloped and were married in New York on June 6 last. Mr. Peters refused Wednesday night to give the name of the clergyman who performed the ceremony. They boarded for while and recently took a flat on the third floor of No. 364 west One Hundred and Sixteenth street. Mrs. Peters' family became reconciled to her marriage and lately they have visited her frequently and many of her old friends have taken dinner with them.

Five of her friends were dining there Wednesday night. During the meal Peters said he found it necessary to reproach his wife for drinking more wine than she should. He said he had spoken to her about wine drinking before.

Leaving the table, she went to a sideboard, filled a small glass full of carbolic acid and, facing the diners, she placed it to her lips, saying, "Well, I'm tired of this."

Her husband ran across the room and dashed the glass from her hand, but she had swallowed the contents and fell in convulsions.

Dr. Elisha Fenn and Dr. Fox worked over her for several hours. She regained consciousness and begged the doctors to save her life, which led her husband to believe she had not intended to commit suicide. She became worse, however, and died at 10:30 o'clock. Mrs. Peters was 26 years old, high spirited and pretty.
