JOHN ARMSTRONG CHANLER

A dispatch from Charlottesville says:

The story of the reappearance of John Armstrong Chanler has excited the deepest interest. It is undeniable that in the neighborhood of "Merrie Mills" and "Castle Hill," where some years of his life were spent, there are many who have not wavered in their conviction that Mr. Chanler was badly treated before the divorce which separated him from Amelie Rives, worse treated by that decree, and outraged by his confinement in Bloomingdale.

In this last affair they saw nothing less than a selfish effort on the part of his brother and sisters to get control of his vast means. It must not be understood, however, that no doubt existed in the neighborhood of "Merrie Mills," his Albemarle home, as to his sanity.

In the early spring of 1897 his studious retirement was intruded upon by a brother, Winthrop Chanler, of New York, and a friend, who evading the valet, reached Mr. Chanler's room by a side entrance. They were received with evident lack of welcome. During their conversation the valet, who had been ordered to allow no one to enter "Merrie Mills" unless over that servant's dead body, appeared on the scene prepared to make explanations. His master interrupting the conversation for a moment for that purpose, coolly kicked his man down stairs and quickly resumed the interview.

For a time it seemed certain that he would meet in successful Chanler's counsel will make an effort to get the courts of New York to recognize the competency of the order of the Virginia Court. If they can do this Chanler will be free from danger of a second confinement, and then his counsel will proceed to recover his property and force a full accounting of all funds that are in or have passed through the committee's hands. There is talk of a suit for damages on the ground of conspiracy and unlawful collusion to confine Chanler in an asylum.

A dispatch from New York says: Speaking Saturday of John Armstrong Chanler, who escaped from the Bloomingdale Asylum, Augustus Van Wyck, one of Mr. Chanler's attorneys, said: "There is no doubt that Mr. Chanler is entirely competent. Since his escape from Bloomingdale, as has been stated, he has been under the scrutiny of the very best specialists in this country. They have all expressed themselves as satisfied that he is sound of mind and able to take care of his private affairs. As to his future course, I am not at liberty to talk. Since he has been in Virginia he has been engaged in preparing a book on psychology. When it is published and by whom I cannot tell just now." Mr. Van Wyck would not say if it was Mr. Chanler's intention to return to New York soon.

CONFESSED HER GUILT.

Herman Klahre, five years old, living in Chicago, has had a lesson in unwilling martyrdom. The child was whipped as an incorrigible and his parents, finally convinced that he was without moral understanding, were about to send him to a private insane asylum. Now, instead of blows, the boy is getting tears and kisses. Emma Dobbstein, 14 years old, who was employed to nurse Herman and his younger sister, has confessed that she is guilty of arson, theft and the malicious destruction of \$700 worth of property in the Klahre residence. It was for these crimes that the boy was punished. The girl was arrested. A week ago money was missed from Mrs. Klahre's purse. The next morning clothing was found slashed. The girl said that Herman had done the damage and though he denied it he was whipped.

Not from that time was there scarcely an hour that some new discovery failed to show that other clothing had been ruined. On Wednesday morning a bed room was found on fire. Suspicion was directed against Herman and his father took him away. Mrs. Klahre left the house in charge of the girl on Thursday and soon after a neighbor was startled by Emma screaming that there were ghosts in the house. An investigation






