LOCAL MATTERS.

WEATHER PROBABILITIES.—For this section fair and warmer tonight; Wednesday increasing clouds, probably rain; Wednesday night, warmer; light to fresh westerly winds.

THROUGH TRAIN FROM RICHMOND TO WASHINGTON.—Beginning on the 1st of November, the train en route from the Richmond, Fredericksburg and Potomac Road will run through Richmond to Washington.

RIVER NOTES.—The wharves at Liverpool Point, Md., and Stuart, Va., which have been in bad condition for some time, are to be overhauled and repaired, so that steamers can land at them without trouble in all weathers.

SCARCITY OF LABOR.—A gentleman from Fairfax county who was in this city today complained of the scarcity of labor in the country and the impossibility of obtaining reliable help on farms.

ARRESTED ON SUSPICION.—A criminal assault was committed on a young white woman at Culpeper some time ago and a reward of \$150 was offered by the Virginia authorities for the arrest of a "copper colored negro, five feet nine inches in height, twenty years old, weighing about 175 pounds."

SUGGESTS PERMISSORY ORDER.—W. C. Ainsworth, District of Columbia electrical engineer, has renewed his recommendation to the Washington, Alexandria and Mount Vernon Railroad Company to be required to remove a certain electric switch and attachments in its trolley pit at 14th street and Maryland avenue southwest.

WANTS \$25,000 DAMAGES.—William W. Osborne, a breeder and trainer of horses, yesterday filed suit in Washington against the Southern Railway Company to recover \$25,000 damages claimed for personal injuries received in a collision which occurred between two trains of the defendant on June 15 last.
