THE SOUTH AND THE BOERS.

The London Telegraph recently in an editorial deploring the death of Col. Benson, R. A., in an action fought by the Boers under that officer with a thousand Boers directed by Louis Botha in person concludes the article as follows:

"What England grudges is the unnecessary loss of life. The friends of the Boers in this country, encourage the purposeless struggle by assuring them that for every month they can prolong the conflict they are morally entitled to better terms. Even Mr. John Morley, if he has to choose between extermination and surrender, casts his vote for the latter. It is not for us but for the Boers to decide whether it shall be extermination or not. And in this connection we would advise wavering patriots to study the lecture which Mr. C. F. Adams (son of a former United States Minister to England) addressed to the American Antiquarian Society recently. He drew a parallel between the Civil War in America and that which is now being fought in South Africa, 'merely to call attention, in view of what is now taking place elsewhere, to the narrow escape we ourselves (the Americans), forty-six years ago, had from a similar awful catastrophe.' Who was it that spared the United States this disaster? Not the conquerors, but repeatedly proferring terms of peace, but the vanquished, by realizing that 'all had been done that could be done and a better done to us.' A braver soldier, more skillful general, a better Christian, or a fiercer gentleman never uttered a word than Robert Edward Lee, nor one more thoroughly convinced of the justice of the cause he had so splendidly defended. Before the surrender of Appomattox Lee was urged to continue a guerilla warfare, for the prosecution of which he had far better resources than any at the disposal of the Boers since the surrender of Princeton. He refused to do this course on the ground that slaughter which led to no definite goal was no better than murder. In his first letter to General Lee his opponent, General Grant, had said: 'The result of the last week had convinced you of the hopelessness of further resistance on the part of the Army of Northern Virginia in this struggle. I feel that it is so, and regard it as my duty to lift from myself the responsibility of any further effusion of blood by asking the surrender of that portion of the Confederate States Army known as the Army of Northern Virginia.' To which Lee replied: 'Though not entertaining the opinion you express on the hopelessness of further resistance, I reciprocate your desire to avoid needless effusion of blood,' and in a later note he said: 'To be frank, I do not think the emergency has arisen to call for the surrender of this army, but as the restoration of peace should be the sole object of all I desire to know whether your proposal would lead to that end.' Grant had no terms to offer beyond those which the Boers had had before them for a year. Lee's words to a friend after the war was over might well be addressed to the enemy today: 'If you intend to reside in this country and wish to do your part in the restoration of your State and in the government of the country, which I think it is the duty of every citizen to do, I know of no objection to your taking the amicable oath.'"

ALMOST BURIED ALIVE.—

Jan. Wynn, an Oxford, Ala., blacksmith, narrowly escaped being buried alive yesterday. After the funeral services the casket was opened at the grave, when the body was seen to move. The casket was hurried back to the home of Wynn, where he revived and is now under treatment. Wynn had been pronounced dead by the physicians and he lay apparently dead for two nights and a day.
