TO-DAY'S TELEGRAPHIC NEWS

Governor Montague. Richmond, Jan. 1.—At noon today, Andrew Jackson Montague became the Governor of Virginia. The ceremonies attending the inauguration of the new Governor were simple, though more ceremony attended his induction into office than was at one time contemplated.

The inauguration ceremony took place in the Hall of the House of Delegates and in the presence of the members of the Constitutional Convention and a committee from the General Assembly, as well as of many other citizens as could find room.

Mr. Montague came to the Capitol shortly before noon. He was escorted into the hall by Governor Tyler, and the committee from the convention and the Legislature, who also acted as an escort. President Goode presided and the oath of office was administered to the new Governor by Judge Keith, of the Supreme Court of Appeals.

Governor Montague then delivered his inaugural address which was a brilliant one. He referred to the Constitutional Convention and its important duties at this particular time in Virginia's history, the marked improvement in the material welfare of the State in the past century, the increase in her manufactures, etc., alluded to the educational institutions and public school system; urged the necessity for modern roads; favored a State exhibit at the St. Louis fair, and an active participation in the coming tri-centenary celebration.

The new Governor then ascended to the Executive office on the third floor of the Capitol and was inducted into the work.

This was the end of the ceremonies of the day. Tonight there will be the gubernatorial reception. It has for years been the custom for the new Governor to have a public reception at the Mansion on the night of his entry upon the duties of office. It is always one of the most brilliant of social affairs, and the first of the events at the Mansion during the term of Governor Montague will not be at all below the average of these inaugural receptions in the time past. The reception this evening will be attended by the talent and beauty of the State and the military in uniform.

Result of Midnight Revival. Cleveland, O., Jan. 1.—At 11:45 last night, Mrs. Frank B. Bays and Lucy Below were brutally enjoying themselves. Much liquor was consumed and Bays, his wife and Lucy Below, a niece, were in an advanced stage of intoxication when Bays finally insisted on returning. While he was in bed his wife offered him a glass of beer which he refused. Bays became angry when his wife insisted that he drink the beer, and picked up a lamp at the bedside threw it at her. The lamp exploded and Mrs. Bays and Lucy Below were covered with burning oil. A minute later they were writing in agony. Bays rushed from the building with only a thin undershirt for a covering. With the temperature below freezing he went through the downtown district and was not captured until 30 minutes after he left the house. Neighbors went to the assistance of the two women and by rolling them in blankets, extinguished the flames. The house had caught fire in the meantime but the flames were extinguished. The women were conveyed to the hospital where Lucy Below soon died. Mrs. Bays can hardly recover.

Foreign News.

Kiel, Jan. 1.—That the government does not expect an early settlement of the difficulties existing between Germany and Venezuela is attested by the orders for naval activity. It is reliably stated that six war ships have been ordered to prepare to go to Venezuela some time during the present month.

London, Jan. 1.—A dispatch from Monte Carlo states that Lord Rosslyn, who, it was recently announced, wished to form a syndicate of moneyed men to break the bank according to a new system which he had devised, won \$20,000 last evening by his system.

Dublin, Jan. 1.—The drapery store of the Todd Bros Company was burned out last night. One hundred and twenty employees of the company, who sleep in the building, barely escaped in their night clothes. The damage amounted to several thousand pounds.

Capetown, Jan. 1.—The bubonic plague has broken out at Port Elizabeth, on the southern coast of Cape Colony.

New York Jan. 1.—New York celebrated today the advent of the new year and of the new municipal administration. At 12 o'clock, noon, Mayor Van Wyck turned over his office to Seth Low, and Tammany Hall will be out of power. The streets are almost deserted. Forty thousand office holders this morning wondered how the change of administration would affect them, while others who were not protected by civil service laws were preparing to go to work again. Mayor Van Wyck who leaves office today will return to the practice of law.

The New York Legislature. Albany, N. Y., Jan. 1.—The legislature of 1902 assembled today. After the reading of the Governor's message and the introduction of bills in both houses an adjournment was taken till Monday. In his message Governor O'Connell says that the tax rate for the coming year will probably be the lowest direct tax in the history of the State. Under the caption of "Home rule for cities," the Governor says that before right was given to sell liquor seven days a week, in any city, the question should be passed upon by the people of the whole State. He opposes open saloons on Sundays.
