



HICKS FOR JANUARY.

A storm period is central on the 3rd, reaching from the 1st to the 5th with moon in last quarter on the 1st and apogee on the 4th. Falling barometer, change to warmer, followed by cloudiness and rain and snow may be expected in many sections during this period, followed by rising barometer, westerly to northerly winds and cold, clearing weather. At new moon on 9th look for rise in temperature progressively from the west, falling barometer and rain turning to snow and sleet from the 9th to 11th. Return is at superior conjunction with Earth and Sun on the 9th. At mid month, in many parts of the earth will be a period for several days before and after this date.

The Vulcan storm period central on the 15th is combined with the Mercury disturbance. The superior conjunction of Jupiter and Sun and Earth falls also on the 15th. Winter thunder storms southward with rain and gales will set in by the 14th, merging into severe sleet storms with snow blockades and wide reaching blizzards over central to northern sections. Mercury is the "sleeper"; always expect during his periods especially when other causes combine to winter, the most destructive sleet storms with blizzards and cold wave squalls. Plan your work so as to escape exposure and danger at and about this time. Throughout the Mercury period or up to the full moon on the 23rd look for unsettled, stormy weather, continued cloudiness with much snow and sleet. A secondary disturbance will be central about the 20th to 23rd, bringing quickened winter storms and a very wide and severe cold wave will sweep over the country about the end of the Mercury period.

During the Vulcan storm period, central on the 25th, reaching from the 24th to 28th, the temperature will relax from the severe cold following the storms of the last period, the barometer will fall and about the 26th to 28th more storms of rain and snow will traverse the country from west to east.

\$10,000 A YEAR NOT TO SUE.—The wife of George Odis Draper, of Lexington, Ky., refuses to be reconciled to her husband, and they are not to be divorced. Their friends say he gives her \$10,000 a year, the custody of the children and accepts the burden of blame for her unexplained action. This he does, it is said, to avoid a divorce suit. He is there now on a visit to his children, but he is going abroad for a long voyage with his father, General William F. Draper, formerly American Ambassador to Italy. The couple were married nine years ago. She was Miss Lilly Duncan, maid of honor at the wedding of Miss Jessie Preston, her aunt, to George Draper, whose best man was his nephew, George Odis Draper. The best man and the maid of honor fell in love with each other instantly. On her seventeenth birthday they were married. She was united a year ago to the exemplary young man of Hopedale Mass., devoted exclusively to her home. Suddenly Boston's festivals in fashionable society captivated her. Still, their friends believed Mr. and Mrs. Draper were unalterably attached to each other. Her removal to a hotel in Boston, with her children, shocked society as a startling mystery.

POWERFUL SEARCHLIGHT.—A pillar of white light miles in height to stream between sunset and sunrise from a black sea to the dome of night to warn mariners of the dangers of Diamond Shoals was successfully tested for the first time aboard lightship No. 71 at Locust Point, Baltimore, at 6 o'clock yesterday evening. A blinding beam of electric light 13 inches wide shot up from the vessel's forward deck and pierced cloudless skies to the stars. At the heavens the powerful rays spread out until they seemed eight feet wide. The ships regular beacon light are visible 18 miles at sea, but they look like tallow dips in comparison to the 3,000-candlepower search light. This powerful searchlight will be the first of its kind ever placed at sea as a mariner's beacon, and it is expected that it will be seen 40 miles off shore.

TO HYPNOTIZE CHILDREN.—Judge Davis, president of the Terre Haute, Ind., board of children's guardians, has given his consent to "Prof." Henry of a Chicago school of hypnosis to experiment with the children in the home maintained by the board. It is Mr. Henry's theory that by hypnotic suggestion he can start a train of thought in the minds of the children for better things. Children who have been taken from vicious parents will be experimented upon. Judge Davis says he does not believe it can do the children harm and possibly will have good results.

DRIVE AT ENGLISH PRESSURES.—There is a smart saying current in London that nowadays all the peccates are either actresses or Americans, and that the members of the old aristocracy have all gone into trade. The latest recruit

for the latter is the Duke of Cambridge's daughter-in-law, Mrs. George Fitz-George, whose husband is a colonel. This lady will shortly start a hygienic beauty salon in the heart of Mayfair, where she hopes to rid her fashionable friends' faces of wrinkles and other blemishes.
