ANOTHER MINE HORROR.

Twenty-one dead bodies were taken out of Lost Creek coal mine near Eddyville, Iowa, yesterday, as the result of one of the most disastrous mine explosions ever known in the State. Eight more are named and buried, and five of this number are expected to die. The fire which broke out in the mine was extinguished after several hours' work but not until several of the dead had been buried beyond recognition.

Shortly after the noon hour yesterday, while the miners in the lower ledge were blasting with dynamite, an explosion or combustion of mine damp, known to the miner as the "windy shot," took place, and the entire interior of the mine was wrecked. Those who were not killed outright were caught in the burning debris, pinned beneath the shattered timbers, and slowly burned to death. One hundred miners were employed at the time of the explosion.

Those nearest the shaft escaped, while those farther in the interior were caught by the falling debris or overcome by the gas and rendered unconscious, where they lay until timbers fell upon them or they were partially consumed by the flames.

The shock was perceptible many rods from the shaft. The flames shot 200 feet into the air.

The miners unemployed went to the assistance of their unfortunate comrades, but the top works were torn up, and this, together with the heated air and flames from below, so retarded all progress that it was realized it once but almost all aid would be useless.

Buckets of water were procured, and the miners fought the flames. They crept down the ladders one after the other, threw water, and then climbing to the top, would fall unconscious.

The smoke and gas arising from the interior were so bad that no one could live a few feet below the surface.

The top of the shaft was blocked by debris. The door to the east entry of the shaft was blown out, and for some time it was impossible to get the air shaft to work.

As soon as the door was placed on its hinges the air began to circulate, and the work progressed to such an extent that the flames were controlled.

The first view the rescuers had of the bottom of the shaft was sickening. The bodies were piled up in heaps, or lying where the men were at work when the explosion came. The rescuers rubbed over the dead in efforts to save the living.

It was six hours before the mine could be thoroughly explored and the last body removed.

SUIT FOR DIVORCE.—After being seven years the wife of Dr. Buenildo Arthur Schott, who won her heart by charming death in her presence, after taking a sugar powder, Mrs. Schott now sues in a New York court for an absolute divorce. She names twenty-five correspondents. The doctor, who is a dentist, and is now under court order to pay a \$100 fine on charges preferred by the New York Dental Association, admits that he won his bride by deception, and that all efforts of her family to effect reconciliation have failed. Mrs. Schott is a beautiful woman of only twenty-five. Before her marriage, she was Etelle Darjardins. She had repeatedly rejected the "doctor," she said last night, until finally he swallowed a powder before her, crying "Farewell, you'll never have another chance to refuse me!" A physician found the suit or moaning on the floor and rolling his eyes in agonies of a simulated death struggle. A stomach pump revived him and the young woman accused him back to complete recovery, she says, in a few days, and then married him. Long afterward, she admits, he told her he had swallowed sugar, and it was all a ruse.

KISSING IN CHURCH.—Rev. Clarence Blakely, of the Dutch Hollow Reformed Church, of Goshen, N. Y., has brought down upon his head a torrent of indignant denial from the young members of his congregation, whom he accused of kissing in the sanctuary. The clergyman announced Thursday night that there must be no more love-making in the church. He said that for the last six months he has known that it was the habit of young men and women to attend the church, which is lighted by kerosene lamps, simply that they might kiss in the sanctuary, and darkness and make love. During the week of prayer, he declared, he was annoyed nightly by loud snatches. Mr. Blakely, who is a widower, criticized the young men more severely than he did the young women. The young men and women of the church assert that there is no foundation for the clergyman's charges.


