MISS STONE'S STORY.

The following account of the captivity of Miss Stone has been obtained from reliable sources, some of the information having been secured from accomplices of the brigands.

After the capture of the missionaries near Banako, September 3 last, the brigands hastened across the boundary and established themselves on the mountain of Guelpepe, in the Elieidre district.

While awaiting the result of their efforts to secure the ransom, the brigands drew their supplies from the adjacent village of Ledjuma. Feeling perfectly secure the members of the band used to show themselves openly in Ledjuma and neighboring villages until they were warned by their local adherents to be more careful. The prisoners, however, were jealously secluded.

When C. M. Dickinson, United States Consul General at Constantinople, arrived in Sofia early in October last, and disclosed to the authorities the whereabouts of Miss Stone's captors, the results were nearly disastrous to the prisoners.

The cold weather made travel in the mountains a dreary ordeal for Miss Stone and Mrs. Telka, encumbered as they were with the latter's infant. Every change of camp occurred at night. The mountain roads were frequently almost impassable, being so deep in snow.

The brigands treated their captives as kindly as the circumstances permitted, but the food supply was necessarily precarious, though the ladies were given the best the inhospitable region afforded. The strain and suspense equalled the physical hardships.

The captives at no time knew their whereabouts, the brigands always telling them that they were not in Bulgaria, and they were in constant fear of an attack by the troops, whom the friendship of the natives was not always able to prevent coming close upon the trail of the band.

An equal cause of anxiety was the baby, which it was frequently feared would die from exposure.

Not until November 3 did the American emissaries come in touch with the brigands, which was then established in a cave near Dabuzita; but fear of the troops forced the brigands to another flight. This was made in a blinding snowstorm, which covered the tracks of the outlaws, but caused bitter sufferings to the captives. After this the brigands succeeded in completely eluding the authorities, and toward the end of November, by a long circuit, they succeeded in returning to their old haunts in the Elieidre district.

They were followed by a circulated report that the captives were dead, and from that time managed to keep Miss Stone and Madame Telka safely under cover until the actual release of the captives took place.

SILVER VANISHED AT METRO LUNCHEON.—So enthusiastic were many hidden to the luncheon at the shipyard in New York of the Townsend-Downey Company at the launch of the German Emperor's yacht that hundreds of articles used in adorning the tables have been taken as souvenirs.

The firm had provided 2500 plates to be distributed as mementos of the occasion. The cutler, Rupert Fritz, had furnished china, silverware, cutlery and decorations to be used merely as means of serving the luncheon. He says that a large part of them have been ferried across the bay to various homes and hotels.

"If I were a rich man," said he, "I would be glad that they were taken. I don't know that I am sorry now. It was a grand occasion, and when the boat slipped into the water there was no stopping the enthusiasm. It was natural that persons should desire remembrances."

"I guess that the souvenir plates were not passed out quickly enough, and many thought that everything was to go."

Mr. Fritz is steward of the Lederkraut Club. He is now counting his spoons, his knives and his chinaware. "Fifty candelabra," he said, "all I had, silverware, knives, forks, spoons, plates, I know not how many. I would willingly have given much more than the value of my belongings if I could have sold them."

"Everything went off so smoothly. It was my honor to give the first glass of wine to the President and to his Royal Highness Prince Henry. Could the ladies and gentlemen be held accountable if they wished souvenirs of such an affair? They have them. I don't know but that the guests were justified, only I don't feel that I can stand the loss of so many things."

Mr. Downey, of the Townsend-Downey Company, said Friday afternoon that he had made a contract with Mr. Fritz to furnish the luncheon, but had not as yet received any report of the fact that so many souvenirs had been taken from the island.

In view of the fact that he had on his desk five hundred letters congratulating him on the success of the launching, he regarded the gathering of the unintended souvenirs as merely an incident.

ACTOR IS JEALOUS OF WIFE'S SUCCESS.—All Paris is eagerly gossiping about an artistic rivalry which threatens to separate M. and Mme. Lebarry.

The mutual devotion of this pair had been cited as a beautiful example of good fortune unfortunately too rare among stage people, until Mme. Lebarry leaped into fame at a single bound a few months ago with the production of a play. The public has packed the theatre where she has been appearing the last three months, and the critics unanimously rank her with Rejane for talent, while her youth gives her Lebarry an unquestionable superiority.

No success was ever before so complete and instantaneous as hers, and her "Bau Brummel" husband, whose position at the Comedie Francaise was only attained slowly, has given signs of jealousy. He has been pook-pooking his wife's efforts openly, saying that she owed her triumph solely to his own reputation and coaching.

The little actress resented her husband's patronizing, and it is said that she even asked him to keep away from her theatre, giving public notice to that effect that only plays submitted to herself personally would be considered.

Mme. Lebarry before marriage was Simonee Binda, an heiress. When she was wedded to an actor three years ago against the wishes of her family the event caused a profound sensation.

She brought her husband \$2,000,000 besides prospects of a further inheritance. She is now in her twenty-five years old, fascinating and pretty.

The first consequence of the trouble between husband and wife is the smashing of the plans for Lebarry's American tour next fall, as his wife refuses to accompany him.

Charles Frohman, who really counted more on Mme. Lebarry than on her husband as a drawing card, will not engage "Brummel" unless the latter can reach an agreement with his wife.
