## BRYAN ATTACKS HILL.

Mr. William J. Bryan has, in his wayward, lauded David B. Hill as a candidate for the Presidency, and after announcing the candidacy attacks both the candidate and the so-called platform. Mr. Bryan in his newspaper, The Commoner, which will be issued tomorrow, will devote the whole of the first page to an arraignment of Mr. Hill.

He says the New Yorker's speech before the Manhattan Club may be so regarded as a formal announcement of his candidacy before the next democratic national convention, and says it is fortunate for the party that his aims are now understood. He accuses Mr. Hill of being sulker and a repudiator during the last two campaigns, and says: "As is well known he refused to give a single word of encouragement to the democratic ticket, and, as a result, whatever influence he had was thrown against the party. When the campaign was over he wrote a carefully prepared magazine article attacking the democratic platform and arguing against it. He is the favorite son of the reorganizing element of the party in Maryland. He is the special representative of those who have so completely forgotten the story of the 'Prodigal Son' that they would place the paternal homestead on wheels and start in hot pursuit of the wayward son, determined to compel the boy to destroy and his father for wholesome food."

After quoting the so-called Hill platform, Mr. Bryan proceeds to dissect it, saying: "He is sound on imperialism, but the Kansas City platform is stronger, clearer and more explicit than his. His advice to press tariff reform comes with had grace from one who, as a democratic Senator, refused to support the only tariff reform measure passed since the civil war. As his silence in 1896 contributed to the success of the most conspicuous high tariff advocate in the nation, it is evident that his hostility to a protective tariff is of recent and sudden growth.

"As for reciprocity, republicans favor where it will do no good and democrats favor a tariff reform that will largely remove the necessity for reciprocity.

The ex-Senator's position on the money question is declared to be that of an "artful dodger." Mr. Bryan concludes by saying: "Mr. Hill is the leader of those who would make the democratic platform nearly like the republican platform that a democratic victory, even if possible, would mean nothing to the people at large."

## 'KEEP NEGROES OUT OF CITIES.'

At a meeting in the interest of education in the South held in Carnegie Hall, New York, last night, Booker T. Washington, the Alabama negro educator, in the course of an address said: "For 250 years the negro was worked. What he wanted to learn now is to work. There is a vast difference between working and being worked. For one to learn that work is honorable and to be idle is dishonorable is at the foundation of civilization. It is not the negro who has been properly trained in head, hand and heart who commits crime. It is the ignorant, shiftless negro who has no regular occupation, who has not learned to love labor and who does not own a home who is usually the criminal. When a man becomes the owner of a piece of land and a decent house and has a bank account, he becomes at once a conservative, law-abiding citizen and one who can be trusted to vote intelligently for the best interests of the community in which he lives. With the negro, as with every weak and inexperienced race, it is important that he be taught that his salvation is learning to work, to be industrious and skillfully the soil. To the negro just now talk the wheat, all else the chaff. Agriculture will prove our salvation, and the race should be slow to abandon the farm. Just now a large proportion of the race needs that education which will make the youth return to the farm and produce 50 bushels of corn where only 25 bushels were before, rather than yield to the temptation to go to a city and attempt to live by their wits. Those who would help save my race should use their influence to keep the negro out of the large cities and especially the cities of the North. These are some of the lessons that Hampton and Tuskegee institutes are constantly teaching. The time has come when we must see to it that all the opportunities for the very best education are available in the South have the fullest opportunities for the very best education. All must be educated without regard to color. Out of her poverty the South has done well, for the tremendous demands upon her for the education of two races should enlist your hearty interest and support. Providing for education in the South is not a matter of giving alms or mere philanthropy; it is a matter of business that concerns the whole country."
