MAYOR PARKER HORSEWHIPPED.

Miss Blanche Boise, a protegee of Mrs. Nation, horsewhipped Mayor Parker of Topeka, Kan., in his office at the city building yesterday. Three times she slashed the mayor and then she sprang to her feet, tore the raveling out of her hair and pushed her into the hall. As Miss Boise was thrust out of the office she exclaimed: "Thank God, I've done it; I've horsewhipped you and now I'm going to horsewhip the governor." Before beginning her horsewhipping Miss Boise gave the mayor a severe scolding, and accused him of being responsible for the fact that the joints are running openly in Topeka. She then pulled the horsewhip from the folds of her dress and before the mayor knew what had happened she struck him three times across the head and shoulders. Miss Boise is about thirty-five years of age and is a nurse by profession. When seen by reporters after the affair, Mayor Parker refused to discuss it. The woman who whipped him talked freely. She said: "I was in sympathy with Mrs. Nation, but did not take part in her raids. I have come to the conclusion that the only way to make public officers enforce the temperance laws is to horsewhip them. I have an organization behind me and we have whips for Gov. Stanley and Judge Hezo. I will wait and see how this dose affects Mayor Parker before I repeat it. I think it is a good plan."

TERRIBLE LOSS OF LIFE.—The steamship Duke of Edinburgh, which arrived at Tacoma, Wash., last night, brings news of a terrible and unprecedented disaster at the Oniro Petroleum Works, the big refinery establishment at Katsunonaga, near Nigatta on the west coast of Japan, which involved the loss of fully 200 lives. The works were located under the brow of a steep hill, and there had been a heavy fall of snow. Suddenly, a large avalanche tumbled down from the sheer height of 600 feet, crushing and burying the oil works, buildings, tanks, reservoirs, offices, and work people's dwellings. Part of the place was buried and submerged, in another portion the roofs were crushed in and buildings shattered. This caused an outbreak of fire, which reached the oil and spread with awful rapidity through that part of the buildings less heavily buried. Up to the latest telegrams received at Yokohama eighty bodies had been recovered, and four persons had been dug out terribly injured and barely alive. The total number buried and burned was not yet ascertained, but the superintendent of the works placed the number of fatalities at not fewer than 200.

CONDITION OF THE NEGRO.—Representative Irwin (rep., Ky.) yesterday introduced in the House a bill to create a commission to inquire into the condition of the colored people of the United States. The measure provides that the President shall appoint a board of five persons, to be known as the Freedmen's Equity Commission, whose duty it shall be to make a comprehensive investigation of the negro race in the United States, their educational progress, and the best means of promoting harmony between the races. The commission is directed to make a report to Congress concerning the adjustment of the racial troubles. The bill provides that the commission shall endure for three years and the commissioners receive an annual salary of \$3,500 and expenses.

SHOT BY HOLINESS PREACHER.—Rev. Eosley Lamar, a Holiness preacher, shot and killed Calvin Van Winkle, aged twenty-four years, a well-to-do citizen of Cumberland, I. T., Sunday night. Before the services in his church began, Lamar made the statement that no other Christian belief than that of the Holiness sect was of any value. William Van Winkle, father of the young man who was slain, is a strong Baptist and was offended at the statement of the preacher, and invited him outside. Lamar followed the elder Van Winkle out of doors. Calvin Van Winkle heard the men quarreling, came to his father's rescue and was killed. Several shots were exchanged between the elder Van Winkle and Lamar without damage. Lamar is under arrest.

MISCELLANEOUS. The French Chamber of Deputies yesterday voted \$100,000 to defray the expenses of President Loubat's projected visit to Russia.

Rev. W. Whiting, who has charge of the Quaker Church in Washington, Ind., has been granted a divorce from a Chicago woman with whom he had lived three months. He alleged that he became acquainted with her through a newspaper advertisement and after her marriage she made fun of his sermons.

The Vatican expects an April pilgrimage of Brooklynites headed by Bishop McDonnell, of that city, about the end of the month. It is thought that Bishop McDonnell, during his sojourn in Rome, will be consulted regarding his appointment as coadjutor to Archbishop Corrigan of New York and upon several important questions concerning the Brooklyn diocese.

Mr. and Mrs. Cain, who reside in the outskirts of Parker-burg W. Va., surprised the population Sunday morning by the announcement that Mrs. Cain had given birth to quadruplets, two boys and two girls. The doctor in attendance thinks that all the children will live as well as the mother. Mr. Cain is a laborer and feels highly pleased with the nest full of little ones.

There are 273 cases of leprosy in the United States. Of these, 186 were probably contracted in this country. Of the people affected 176 are males, 102 females and 145 were born in the United States. Of the number only 176 cases are isolated and the disease is a contagious one. Florida has 24 cases; Georgia, 1; Louisiana, 155; Maryland, 1; The establishment of a national home for lepers under the supervision of the general government is recommended either in the arid southwest or on an island in the Gulf of Mexico or near the Pacific coast.
