## SUBTERRANEAN RIVER.

A most startling story of discovery in an underground cavern is told by Elmer Bright, a young farmer living east of Findlay, O., and his two companions, who came to the office of the water works trustees and made their report of work done for that body.

The men have been employed by the board in opening up a cave that has been known to exist in the limestone ridge on the line between Hancock and Seneca counties, the entrance to which was closed thirty-two years ago by the owner of the land.

Legend told of an underground river, and in their search for pure water for Friday the board ordered the cave opened, with the result that a fortnight ago a stream of the clearest water was found running through a large cavern, seventy feet from the top of the ridge. Bright and others were employed in the work and have continued explorations on their own hook, but failed to discoveries that have astonished the neighborhood.

For several days the three men have been making daily journeys into the cave. Well supplied with candles, and with a pick and shovel, they went farther than ever before. Following the stream through a low coiled passageway they came upon a wide room with numerous passages leading from it.

All these were explored and it was found that all but two were simply dead recesses. One of the others leads to depths into the earth yet unexplored, and the other ended with a flight of rudely cut steps leading down ten feet to the side of a solid wall. The steps were evidently chiseled by the hand of man, and excited the greatest expectancy in the breasts of the discoverers. Examination of the surface of the wall showed signs that instead of being solid stone as first imagined, the wall was a cold plaster of a sort of mud mortar.

A few vigorous blows of the pick showed cracks between good sized stones, and harder work disclosed enough to permit the entrance of a man. Through this into utter darkness climbed the three, and the sight that met their eyes froze their blood.

The room was but 15 or 20 feet square, and was evidently a parlor newly by nature but walled up by man. In the center on a flat table rock lay the skeleton of a man of giant stature. About the head were placed copper and stone utensils, while at the feet were rude weapons carved of stone. By close comparison the length of the skeleton is about six feet five inches.

On substitution of their statements the men exhibit a small vessel made of copper, an ornament of strange shape made of pure gold, as well as a stone hatchet similar to those found in the mounds of southern Ohio. They say that the other mementoes which they have at their homes are stone pottery, stone weapons, a rude stone pipe, pieces of flint and various bits of gold and copper, evidently ornaments.

The skeleton of a man that lay over the skeleton crumbled when they endeavored to pick them up, giving evidence of the ages that have passed since the prehistoric chieftain was laid away in the depths of the earth and his tomb sealed with an aboriginal cement.

On their way out of the cavern the men made another discovery that is arousing an interest equal to that of finding the skeleton. Close to the entrance of the first cavern, in a corner farthest from the shores of the river, the men came upon a shallow recess in the rocky walls.

On a ledge they found several pots of melted tallow and above these pots the darkened roof showed that once upon a time candles had burned there and lighted up the gloom. On the damp and mouldy floor they found a bit of paper, that had evidently been torn from a memorandum book.

The discoloration on it was upon it, but in pale ink may still be deciphered the words "James Bare, Oberlin." This is the name of a noted abolitionist and conductor of the underground railway, and his descendants still live in the Ohio college town. The stories of old settlers tell of many a fugitive slave that slept in the house or barn of Bare in his Oberlin home in ante-bellum days. [Toledo B. e.]
