LOCAL MATTERS

WEATHER PROBABILITIES.—For this section cloudy tonight and Friday; probably rain Friday; fresh westerly winds.

CUT WITH GLASS.—Frank, the little son of Mr. Wellons Hines, living on Alfred street, was seriously cut at Washington school building yesterday. The youngster had been sliding down a banister, when one of the scholars, it is said, placed a piece of glass in an aperture. Young Hines in making another descent came in contact with the glass and was badly cut. He bled profusely and medical assistance had to be procured.

MILKMAIDS' CONVENTION.—As has been stated "The Milkmaids' Convention" and "The Eleventh Hour" will be presented at the Opera House tonight for the benefit of the Free Kindergarten. FIRE.—A small frame house in the block bounded by Wolfe, Wilkes, Henry and Fayette streets took fire this morning. The flames were soon discovered and a bucket brigade from the Southern Railway extinguished them without turning in an alarm. The fire is supposed to have been caused by sparks from the power house or passing engines.

HIGH SCHOOL TEAM VICTORIOUS.—The Episcopal High School baseball team yesterday afternoon defeated the Boys' Lat 7 School, of Baltimore, by a score of 17 to 7. The game was played on the grounds of the High School and was well played throughout. The feature of the game was the home run made by Temple for the home team.

DROWNED.—The Eastern Branch claimed another victim yesterday. Edward Steel, the eight-year-old son of Henry Steel, a laborer at the Washington navy yard, was drowned in the Eastern Branch yesterday. The unfortunate lad, in company with two other boys, was in an old skiff, when a sudden breeze upset their craft and threw them into the water. Steel's companions, who were older and stronger than he, succeeded in holding on to the skiff until assistance reached them. Steel was unable to swim, and sank before he could be reached.
