AFFAIRS IN CUBA.

President-elect Palma has arrived at Santa Clara. His journey to that city from Cienfuegos is described as having been a triumphal procession. At every station officials, school teachers, members of the various clubs and Spanish residents boarded the train and extended a most hearty welcome. Before leaving Cienfuegos the working men there gave a breakfast in his honor, eighty guests being present. Creole dishes only were served.
The Ayuntamiento of Havana has arranged a programme for the festivities attendant upon Senor Palma's inauguration. On May 20, after the formal delivery of the government to the Cubans, the Ayuntamiento, accompanied by delegates from all the island municipalities, official corporations and Cuban forces, will proceed to the Plaza de Armas in front of the Palace, and bid good-by to General Wood and the American forces.
The cruiser Brooklyn, on which General Wood will return to the United States, will be escorted out of the harbor by tugs on the night of May 20. On the same night there will be a display of fireworks at Morro Castle, at the entrance of the harbor. At daybreak, May 21, bands will play through the city and later the foundation stone of a triumphal arch will be laid. There will be entertainments, free to the public, and in the evening there will be a popular banquet on the Prado.
On May 22 there will be a procession through the city, and an official banquet will be given at night by the Ayuntamiento to the new government and the foreign consuls.
A tender has been issued declaring Camp Columbia, including all the buildings there, to be part of the system of defense of Cuba, and the chief quartermaster is empowered to appropriate whatever portion of the lands belonging to the camp has not already been acquired by the government of Cuba.
The order says that the camp having been subject to extensive material improvement of a permanent nature, it is suitable for the maintenance of a permanent military training ground.
The Senate met yesterday and approved the credentials of all its members by a vote of 11 to 7. Senor Zayas, a member of the committee on credentials, made a minority report recommending the rejection of the election of the senators from Matanzas. This would have thrown out Senor Capote among others. It is claimed that Senor Zayas's motive was to prevent the election of Senor Capote as president of the Senate. Senor Sanguily being the candidate of the minority.
The executive committee elected Senor Capote president; Ricardo Dolz, first vice president; Jose Antonio Fris, secretary; and Ramon Silva, assistant secretary.
The whole session of the House of Representatives was passed in discussing credentials. The session was disorderly.
The Matanzas representatives met again last night. Both House and Senate are nominally composed of nationalists and republicans. The latter are in a majority.

BIBLES BY THE MILLION.

The annual meeting of the American Bible Society was held at the Bible House in New York yesterday. The eighty-sixth annual report stated that the threatened evils arising from a permanent shrinkage in the support given the society have been arrested.
Fifteen life directors were constituted during the year by the payment of \$150 each, and 263 life members were constituted by the payment of \$30 each. The receipts were \$433,173 and the cash balance at the close of the fiscal year was \$29,329.
Appropriations have been authorized for the foreign work during the current year to an amount not exceeding \$200,000. The total amount of invested funds is \$486,402. The income from these permanent funds for the year was \$19,595.
The total issues of Bibles of the year, at home and abroad, amount to \$1,723,791. This is an increase of 169,633 over those of last year. Of these, 686,755 were distributed in the United States, counting the Philippine Islands and 1,037,036 in foreign lands. This means an increase of 63,421 in the foreign field and 108,242 in the United States. One-half of these issues were manufactured at the Bible House. Of the remainder, a large part were printed in China, Japan, Siam, Syria and Turkey.
The total issues of the society in 88 years amount to 70,677,253. The most notable of the latest publications of the year is the address of President Roosevelt on the Bible, of which 80,000 copies have been printed in English and 10,000 in Spanish.
During the year the society has established a special agency among the colored people of southern States. Rev. Dr. J. P. Wragg, Ga. Under his supervision the colporteurs have been sent out into a number of the southern States to go from place to place and visit the people at their homes. Special depots have been opened in connection with some of the leading schools for
