**HOLLAND'S THRONE.**

The daily bulletins in regard to the condition of Queen Wilhelmina, which are issued from Het Loo, are favorable, but the danger is not over. The question of the succession to the Dutch throne is still very present in the minds of European statesmen. Wilhelmina, who is the last in a direct line though not in fact, acts by reason of her position as a barrier to all dynastic pretensions, but Holland will never really be safe until the Queen has an heir. There is no doubt that the German people look toward Holland with a longing eye, and with which the Dutch regard the Germanization of their country. Nor is the prospect vague and illusory. The German people want their "free born German Ruler" from its source to the sea, and they consider that owing to the configuration of the empire they have a natural right to it. This has been a favorite theme with German writers for many years. According to the arrangements made in 1890 the Dutch throne, falling to Wilhelmina and her possible children, passed to the Grand Duke of Saxe-Weimar. He, of course, is a descendant of the German Emperor, and is such the Dutch people would not tolerate him as a king. It is generally assumed, however, that the grand duke has renounced his claims to the Dutch throne, which would prove a thorny heritage for himself and his heirs. Assuming that this renunciation is true, the next successor is Prince Albrecht of Hohenzollern, regent of Brunswick. He is no more pleasing to the Dutch, who fear that he would naturally govern in the interest of the German Empire, and the drift of Holland to Bavaria's position in the empire of which it would be a maritime arm would be almost irresistible. The Dutch would detest this prospect, and might reject it. Then the foreign offices of Europe would quiver with excitement and alarm.

**TRADE WITH JAPAN.**

The official publication "Commercia Relations of 1901" contains some interesting facts concerning the trade of the United States with Japan last year. The inability of cheap labor to compete with machinery, it is stated, is shown in the fact that the greater part of Japan's exports hitherto has consisted of raw materials, while the largest item of manufactured goods has been cotton yarn, which is shipped almost exclusively to China, a country not so well as Japan, for its cheap labor. One of the most hopeful features of the situation in Japan today is the recognition of this fact by her educated classes. The United States already leads in the exports of electric-light apparatus, mining machinery, paper-making machinery, watch movements, watch cases and bicycles to Japan. In weaving machinery, spinning machinery, fire engines and pumps, tools and implements of farmers and mechanics, sewing machines and photographic apparatus it holds second place. Already the commerce of the United States with Japan is greater than that of any other nation. The revival of business in Japan consequent upon the resumption of traffic with China will result in an enlarged demand for raw cotton and cotton yarn, and the satisfactory adjustment of the finances is expected to give impetus to railway construction, shipbuilding and the manufacture of iron and steel and incidentally to increase the importation of many articles. Inquiry made in Japan as to the relative merits of English and American locomotives proves that, general conditions being equal, the American locomotive is preferred. The United States sends about two-thirds of the iron rails imported to Japan and the same proportion of the nails, having won this last trade from Germany, which five years ago controlled the market. Imports of typewriters from this country represent over 80 per cent. of the total. Efforts are making to perfect a machine in the Japanese language, as there would be quite a demand for Japanese typewriters.

**HORRIBLE MURDER.**—In the kitchen of the Atlantic Hotel at Bridgeport, Conn., yesterday morning, Michael J. Foran, the hotel chef, was murdered by Lawrence Bessano, who hacked Tornish's body with a meat cleaver in a nightful manner. Tornish had been paying considerable attention to one of the kitchen maids, with whom Bessano was infatuated. Bessano was employed in the hotel as fireman. Bad blood had existed between the men, it is said, for several weeks. Tornish was alone in the kitchen when Bessano entered quietly, and seizing a large cleaver, which was on a bench nearby, he stole upon the unsuspecting chef, and struck him a powerful blow with the sharp edge of the instrument, cracking open his skull. Tornish fell unconscious to the floor. Then the enraged Italian jumped upon his body and showered a dozen or more blows upon his head with the cleaver, chopping it into many pieces. One of the waiters in the hotel discovered

Bessano in his bloody work and quickly spread an alarm. When two policemen arrived a few moments later, Bessano was dancing upon Tornish's dead body. The floor of the kitchen was a pool of blood. Bessano had the cleaver in his hand, and flourished it threateningly at the policemen, one of whom struck him on the head with his fist and partially overpowered him. Bessano shrieked wildly and resisted fiercely. He was landed in a cell at police headquarters after a struggle. Later when he recovered from his swoon he said he never felt better in his life, and that he was glad that he had killed Tornish and was ready to be hanged. Tornish had not been long in the city. His parents live in Scarsdale, Pa. He was about thirty years old, and unmarried.
