LOCAL MATTERS.

Fun rises tomorrow at 4:41 a. m. and sets 7:24 a. m. High water at 8:00 a. m. and 6:35 p. m.

WEATHER PROGNOSTIC.—For this section for tonight and Wednesday: rising temperature Wednesday; diminishing northerly winds.

FUNERAL OBITUARIES.—The funeral ceremonies over the remains of the late Leonard Marbury took place in St. Paul's Church at 5 o'clock yesterday afternoon, and although the weather was rainy and blustering at that hour, there was a large attendance on the part of the friends and acquaintances of the deceased. All classes of citizens were represented and the gathering evidenced the esteem in which the deceased was held. The body was borne into the church by eight members of the Alexandria Light Infantry, under command of Sergeant Pierpont, who acted as body bearers. The honorary pall bearers were: Judge J. K. M. Norton and John M. Johnson, of the Alexandria Bar Association; Thom W. Robinson and of the Alexandria Washington Lodge of Masons; Samuel L. Monroe, of the Knights of Pythias, and James T. O'Hara, of the O. I. O. F. The solemn procession moved through the side of the church while the soft notes from the organ rose upon the air. The services were conducted by Rev. Dr. P. P. Phillips, who was very impressive. The choir rendered appropriate hymns. Later the body was replaced in the hearse and the solemn cortege moved toward St. Paul's cemetery where the sepulchre took place. At the grave impressive Masonic services were read by Worshipful Master August Oberholt, of Alexandria. The services were concluded with a eulogy from the Alexandria Light Infantry. The members of the Alexandria-Washington Lodge of Masons and Alexandria Bar Association, of which he was a member, attended the funeral in a body. Delegations from the following organizations of the city were also present: Alexandria Light Infantry, Alexandria Light Infantry Veterans' Association, Old Fellows, Knights of Pythias, Glee Club, Tribe of Red Men, and the Royal Arcanum.

SCHOOL CLOSING.—The closing exercises of Miss Bernice E. Angelo's school took place last night at 301 north Washington street. The pupils presented Miss Angelo with an album as a token of their affection for her. The exercises were interesting throughout and much enjoyed by all present. ENGINE OVERTURNED.—Locomotive No. 17 of the Richmond, Fredericksburg and Potomac Railroad was overturned at the foot of Fountain street, Washington, this morning about half past six o'clock. The engine was attached to a southbound freight train, and the operator in the tower at the approach to Long Bridge had placed a signal for the train to stop. It, however, kept on and the operator, after a moment's hesitation, threw it into a cut-off switch and derailed it in order to avoid a collision with a train which was in the block a short distance ahead. The engineer and fireman, realizing the situation, jumped and escaped injury. The southbound track was blocked until the overturned engine could be replaced upon the track.

DREDGING IN THE POTOMAC.—Col. Allen, the engineer in charge of the improvement of the Potomac river, reports to the War Department that satisfactory progress is being made by the contractor engaged in cutting a channel through shoal places in the lower Potomac. Although the work was delayed by high winds about 50,000 cubic yards of material were dredged and deposited during the month of May. During the progress of the dredging operations in the lower Potomac the wreck of a schooner 80 feet long and 30 feet beam was encountered in the cut at Maryland Point Shoal.

REFRESHING RAIN.—There was a seven-hour's rain yesterday, which arrested vegetation greatly. The recent drought hereabouts was producing apprehension, but yesterday's showers brought relief and gladdened the hearts of farmers and truckers. The city needed the rain also, and the streets received a much-needed washing. The clouds broke between seven and eight o'clock in the evening and northwest winds and cooler weather followed the humid conditions which had prevailed during the day. The weather today has been fair and cool.

COMMONWEALTH'S ATTORNEY.—It is understood that Judge Norton will in a few days fill the vacancy in the office of Commonwealth's Attorney caused by the death of Mr. Leonard Marbury. The July term of the Corporation Court is a grand jury term, and the judge wishes the new attorney to have time to get the affairs of the office well in hand before the opening of that term. There are several applicants for the office, but so far there is no intimation as to whom the judge will appoint.
