

TO CITY TAXPAYERS.—NOTICE. Collectors Office, June 16, 1902. Notice is hereby given that the tax-bills for 1902 are now in the hands of the Collector. The attention of service interests is respectfully called to the following extract from the revenue bill of that year:

"Upon all bills paid in full by the last day of July, 1902, the Collector of Taxes shall allow a discount of ten per cent, and on all bills paid by the last day of September, 1902, he shall allow a discount of five per cent, and on all bills not paid on the last day of December, 1902, there shall be assessed and collected a penalty of five per cent upon the amount of said bills, and on all bills remaining unpaid on the first day of June, 1903, damages at the rate of six per cent per annum shall be paid."

Taxpayers would do well to call and pay in order to avoid the rush and crowd usually present on the last days in which the discount is allowed.
