FATALITIES FROM STORMS.

Three persons were killed and seven or eight badly injured in a tornado that passed over Evansville, Ind., and vicinity Saturday night. The fatalities occurred at St. Wendel, about ten miles from Evansville. The path of the storm was about two miles wide, and it had a fearful velocity. Many buildings were demolished. The loss to property will amount to about \$100,000. The storm was severe at St. Phillips, in Posey county, and one life is reported lost there. The storm struck Evansville also, damaging several buildings.

At Nabs Station, Charleston, and Lexington a number of residences were destroyed.

One man was killed and several thousand dollars' damage was sustained as a result of a rainstorm which occurred in the northwestern section of Louisville, Ky., Saturday afternoon.

A tornado, which struck a Bohemian settlement near Wallis, Tex., Saturday, killed several persons and injured many others. Several negroes are also reported killed. A number of houses were destroyed.

It is reported that Frank Dixon was killed and his wife and two children fatally injured by a storm near Beckville, Tex., Saturday. A heavy rain, accompanied by high wind, did much damage to crops, blew down fences, and unroofed many houses.

A high windstorm Saturday afternoon seriously damaged the telephone exchange in Chattanooga, Tenn. At Racoon, Ga., south of Chickamauga Park, the high wind was followed by a remarkable electric storm, during which J. W. Sivelyn, a farmer, and two of his children were struck by lightning and killed.

All weather records in central Illinois are being broken this year. Rain has been falling steadily for twenty-four hours, approaching a cloudburst in extent at times. At intervals Friday night snow fell, while the temperature dropped to 45 degrees. But for the rain, there would have been frost.

For twenty-four hours Chicago has been in the grasp of one of the heaviest storms of the year. The rain has fallen unceasingly, and the wind has blown a gale off Lake Michigan, the force of the blow rising at times to forty miles an hour. Much damage has been done to truck farms near the city.

A terrible cloudburst swept the greater portion of Madison county, Ill., doing much damage to the crops and washing away bridges and railroad tracks.

Later dispatches from parts of Indiana, Kentucky, Illinois and Texas report much damage from storms. In the latter state the damage has far exceeded that of first reports.

RACE RIOT.

Full particulars of a race riot that was followed by a lynching in Aiken county, S. C., Saturday night, have been received. More trouble was expected, but in view of the large number of the whites in that section the negroes are unlikely to make an open assault.

The negroes got the whites at a disadvantage Saturday night and used it. It was pay-day and a crowd of both races had gone from South Carolina towns to Augusta where there is no dispensary law. At night the returning train-load was composed of negroes and white factory hands, mostly from Langley. Most of the negroes were drunk, and so were numbers of the whites. The row was believed to have been started by a white man attempting to interfere in a fight between negroes. He was attacked and other whites went to his assistance. Then pistols and knives flashed and for three or four minutes the passenger coach in which seventy-five people were crowded was a struggling mass of infuriated, screaming, cursing, shooting and stabbing men.

The whites were unprepared for a fight. They had nothing but pocket-knives, while the negroes were provided with pistols. The train dashed into Langley station and the crew called for assistance. Only two were captured, Ike Collins and Wyatt Holmes were almost backed to pieces. Collins, the sergeant, could not possibly live. The men were carried to the jail. The town authorities, fearing lynching, telegraphed to Sheriff Alderman, at Aiken, for help. The sheriff started for Langley and to divert the mob, telegraphed that they had the wrong man, that the ring-leader had been captured at Aiken. Alderman reached Langley late at night and found the crowd assembled for the lynching. They would take no advice, but charged on the frail jail building, broke in the doors, dragged out the wounded men, one nearly dead, and filled their bodies with lead. The negroes were the targets for hundreds of bullets.
