MURDEROUS NEGRO.

Isaac Hackley Runs Amuck—Attempt to Murder His Family—A Neighbor who Came to the Rescue Seriously Cut—Attempt to Shoot an Officer.

Isaac Hackley, 38 years old, created considerable excitement in the neighborhood of his home, 909 Princess street, about a quarter to twelve o'clock last night by an attempt to slaughter his entire family, a murderous attack on a neighbor who came to the rescue of his intended victim and upon policemen who entered his house.

Funeral of Mrs. Hill.

As has been stated, the remains of Mrs. Mollie A. Hill, wife of Mr. G. Powell Hill, a former Alexandrian, who died in Richmond Sunday last, were brought here from Richmond at 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon. The funeral took place from the depot of the Washington Southern Railway. The services were conducted by Rev. Frank J. Brooke of the Second Presbyterian Church, and the interment was made in the family lot in Ivy Hill cemetery. The following were the pallbearers: Messrs. Thos. W. Robinson, William A. Smoot, G. No Excitement.

John Homer, the young negro who is charged with the criminal assault upon a white girl in Westmoreland county, and who is in the city jail here, will be brought to trial on the fourth Monday in July, and he will doubtless be kept here until just previous to that date, unless it is found unsafe for him. When it became generally known last night that Homer had been brought here for safekeeping, there was a slight feeling of uneasiness, but at a late hour there were no sign of excitement, and the authorities do not anticipate any trouble.

Fined for Contempt.

A young man was before the Mayor this morning charged with disorderly conduct in front of a house on north Lee street. There was no evidence to substantiate the charge and he was dismissed. A woman who was charged with using vulgar language on the street and who had been cited to appear was arrested and fined for contempt.

Death of Mrs. Demaine.

Mrs. Julia C. Demaine, widow of William Demaine, died at the residence of her son in Brooklyn at an early hour this morning aged 76 years. The deceased had recently been critically ill. She leaves two children. Her remains will be brought to this city for interment.

LOCAL BREVITIES.

The scow Pansy with lumber from H. K. Field & Co. sailed today for Tent Landing. The license of Paul Thimmen to conduct business at 519 King street, was today transferred to Joseph B. Drew. The regular meeting of the Hydraulic Engineering Company was held last night and routine business was transacted. There was a well attended meeting of Spanish war veterans at Armory Hall last night. A committee on membership was appointed and it was decided to hold semi-monthly meetings. A deed of sale was recorded in the Corporation Court today by Carrie V. Green, conveying a house and lot on the west side of Patrick street, between Duke and Wolf streets, to the Mercantile Building and Loan Association for \$800. A horse attached to Dr. G. T. Klipstein's buggy ran away from the front of the doctor's office on Prince street this morning. The frightened animal was not stopped until it reached the river. The damage to the buggy was slight. A young man of the Second ward has two beagle puppies which he is getting in training and a young rabbit which he has taught the dogs not to hurt. This morning he had them on the strand, and the dogs showed much cleverness in trailing the rabbit.

COMMUNICATED.

Many complaints are made throughout the city, especially by the sick, of "night owls" prowling about the streets at most unseasonable hours and holding unbecoming conversations under the windows of quiet citizens to the disgust and annoyance of the latter. Moreover, they are liable to be mistaken for burglars at such unseasonable hours, besides sapping the constitution of sound, healthy young men, capable of performing all the requirements of gentlemen, instead of indulging in the immoralities of the condemned and unpopular inebriate. CHARGED WITH MURDERING A CHILD.

Charley Wee, a Chinese laundryman, was arrested in Buffalo, N. Y., yesterday and held on an open charge in connection with the murder of Mary Murphy, a six-year-old girl, who mysteriously disappeared on June 17, and whose body, bound with ropes and wrapped in newspapers and coarse cotton cloth, was found floating in a small pond in Forest Lawn cemetery. The autopsy showed that the child had been outraged and strangled. Public feeling runs high and all the Chinese laundries in Buffalo have been closed and policemen stationed in front of them. Wee's place was thoroughly searched, and the police say they found ample evidence on which to hold the Chinaman. Pieces of rope similar to that on the body were found in the shop. The coarse cotton goods used in the laundry for the purpose of covering ironing boards corresponds exactly in texture with the piece of cloth in which the body was wrapped. In a room used by Wee as a bed chamber the police found blood-stained bed clothing. The wall behind the bed was bespattered with blood. A second Chinaman, who was visiting Wee at the time the arrest was made, was also taken into custody.

MORE CADETS.—The right to make appointments to the Naval Academy is extended to Senators in the pending naval appropriation bill. Every officer hitherto graduated at Annapolis has owed his appointment either to the President or to some Representative in Congress. The 88 places now at the disposal of Senators (Delaware being omitted until she elects Senators) must be filled almost immediately, so as to permit of the candidates preparing for the next entrance examination, which are held throughout the country August 11 under direction of the Civil Service Commission. Under the bill, President Roosevelt is allowed five additional appointments, which will all go to sons of naval officers.
