STAMP ACT RESOLUTIONS.

Long ago a question was started as to the pertinency of the stamp act resolutions passed by the Virginia House of Burgesses in 1765, and which almost would be said to have initiated the revolutionary struggle.

Within the last few weeks a copy of these resolutions, with a memorandum on the back, in the hand writing of Patrick Henry, was deposited in the State Library. An exact reproduction of the copy and of the memorandum, which is fast becoming illegible, is now given:

Resolved, That the first adventurers and settlers of this, His Majesty's colony and dominion, brought with them and transmitted to their posterity and all other His Majesty's subjects since inhabiting in this, His Majesty's said colony, all the privileges, franchises, and immunities that have at any time been held, enjoyed and possessed by the people of Great Britain.

Resolved, That by two royal charters aforesaid are declared entitled to all the privileges, liberties, and immunities of denizens and natural born subjects of all intents and purposes, as if they had been abiding and born within the realm of England:

Resolved, That His Majesty's liege people of this most ancient colony have uninterruptedly enjoyed the right of being thus governed by their own assembly in the article of their taxes and internal police; and that the same hath never been forfeited or any other way given up, but hath been constantly recognized by the Kings and people of Great Britain.

Resolved, Therefore, that the General Assembly of this colony have the only and sole exclusive right and power to lay taxes and impositions upon the inhabitants of this colony, and that every attempt to vest such power in any person or persons whatsoever, other than the General Assembly aforesaid, has a manifest tendency to destroy British as well as American freedom.

The memorandum on the back of the resolutions read as follows:

"The within resolutions passed the House of Burgesses in May, 1765. They formed the first opposition to the stamp act of the scheme of taxing America by the British Parliament. All the colonies, either through fear or want of opportunity to form an opposition, or from inducement of some kind or other, had remained silent. I had been for the first time elected a Burgess a few days before, was young, inexperienced, unacquainted with the forms of the House and the members that composed it. Finding the men of weight averse to opposition and the commencement of the tax at hand, and that no person was likely to step forth, I determined to venture, and alone, unadvised and unassisted on a blank leaf of an old law book wrote the within. Upon offering them in the House violent debate ensued. Many threats were uttered and much abuse cast on me by the party for submission. After a long and warm contest the resolutions passed by a very small majority, perhaps of one or two only. The alarm spread throughout America with astonishing quickness, and the ministerial party were overwhelmed. The great point of resistance to British taxation was universally established in the colonies. This brought on the war, which finally separated the two countries and gave independence to ours. Whether this will prove a blessing or a curse will depend upon the use our people make of the blessings which our gracious God hath bestowed on us. If they are wise they will be great and happy. If they are of a contrary character, they will be miserable. Righteousness alone can exalt them as a nation.

"Reader, whoever thou art, remember this; and in thy sphere practice virtue thyself and encourage it in others."

It was once claimed that John Fleming of "Maiden's Adventure," Cumberland county, was the author of the resolutions, as appears from a statement made by Edmund Randolph in his history of Virginia, which is to be printed for the first time in the July number of the Virginia Magazine of History and Biography.

It has also been claimed that the resolutions were prepared by George Johnston, member of the House of Burgesses for Fairfax county from 1758 to 1766. Mr. R. Walton Moore, of that county, furnishes such data as exists respecting Mr. Johnston's career and his connection with the resolutions. He was a native of Scotland, having been born in Haydon, Virginia, where he died in December (not in the summer as has been asserted) of 1766. He lived between Alexandria and Mt. Vernon and married Sarah, the daughter of Major Dennis McCarthy, of Westmoreland. He was a very prominent lawyer and had an extensive practice in the Northern Neck and Piedmont sections. In the ancient minute books of the County

Court of Fairfax his name is constantly mentioned. His near neighbors were George Washington and George Mason. They were among the "gentleman justices" of that court while he was a leading practitioner at its bar, and they were his friends. His will was admitted to probate in January, 1767. The inventory of his estate shows that he owned an unusually large professional and miscellaneous library for that time, and that he had accumulated much land, many slaves and other property.

It is a tradition in his family that on his return from Williamsburg Mr. Johnston told his wife and others that he drafted the resolutions. In the biographical sketch of Colonel Leven Powell reference is made to George Johnston, jr., who was lieutenant colonel and aide camp on Washington's staff during the revolution and a part of the period his confidential military secretary, and there it is said "his father was an eminent lawyer of Fairfax county, and was a member of the Virginia House of Burgesses, and has been credited with the authorship of the stamp act resolutions. Without questioning the authorship of those celebrated resolutions, it is certain that George Johnston seconded them in a most powerful and logical speech."

[George Johnston was prior to his membership in the House of Burgesses one of the trustees of the town of Alexandria, and some of his descendants are now living in this city. The late Major George Johnston was a great-grandson.]
