TO TAKE THE STUMP.—Representative Livingston of Georgia has agreed to give the democratic congressional committee two months of his time during the coming campaign. He has expressed a desire to be sent to the nearby States, and, accordingly, arrangements will be made to place him on the stump in Maryland, Virginia, West Virginia, Delaware, New Jersey and Pennsylvania. Mr. Livingston is the ranking democratic member of the committee on appropriations. In case the democratic succeed in carrying the next House, he will doubtless be made chairman of that committee, a position now occupied by Mr. Cannon. Mr. Livingston contented that the republican congresses in recent years have been extravagant in expenditures, and that instead of having billion dollar congresses, about which so much was said a few years ago, the republicans have developed billion-dollar sessions of Congress. Mr. Livingston believes that the republican party will do nothing to curb the power of the trusts, and he will chiefly address himself to these two issues while on the stump. During the latter part of August, just before the campaign closes in Maine, Mr. Livingston will go to that State to do some speculating for the democracy there.
