BRYAN IRRECONCILABLE.

Mr. William J. Bryan passed through New York yesterday. He was at the Victoria Hotel for a moment and went on to Boston. He dropped into the Fifth Avenue Hotel, where he had a talk with Representative Sulzer, and then returned to the Victoria and dictated this statement: "The new movement seems to be based on the possibility that the Cleveland-Hill element will obtain control of the democratic party. I do not think that that contingency is probable; nor do I see that any good is to come from a discussion of such a contingency. If the head of the house is sick it is better for the children to try to save his life than to begin to quarrel over the estate in anticipation of his possible death. To make application, it is better to get to work and save the party from the humiliation and disaster that it suffered under Mr. Cleveland's administration than to discuss plans based upon the supposition that the improbable will happen. I agree in what Baron Shibusawa, the Japanese banker, said in regard to our present prosperity, and his speech will reappear in my paper. In the first place, the prosperity spoken of is not universal as claimed. The laboring man has not received an increase in wages proportionate to the cost of living, therefore he is not getting his share of prosperity. In so far as the farmers have prospered, it is due to natural conditions, and not to the governmental politics of the republican party. A large proportion of the commercial enterprises are built upon fictitious capital, and can make dividends on their watered stock only by wholesale extortion from the public. If they prosper the people will suffer. If, on the other hand, the people secure protection from this extortion, the industries will have to pass through a period of reorganization. The speculator and the plunderer are making lots of money, but there is an end, and a disastrous one, to this sort of prosperity."

Just before his departure for Boston Mr. Bryan said: I have had a long talk with Col. James M. Guffey, the democratic national committeeman for the State of Pennsylvania. I said to Colonel Guffey that while I would not insist on a 16-to-1 silver platform in the convention of 1904, I should insist that the next democratic national committee should not nominate any man who had violated the democratic national trust in 1896 and 1900. Colonel Guffey asked me whom I meant, and I replied: Mr. Gorman and Mr. Hill. I do not bother about Mr. Cleveland, because there is nothing to Cleveland at all. Mr. Gorman and Mr. Hill can never purge themselves of the offense of political apostasy in their conduct in the campaigns of 1896 and 1900. I do not propose to permit them to treat the democratic party as they propose to do. I have no fault to find with the gold democrats, the laymen who forsake the party. But here were Hill and Gorman, who had been built up by the democratic organization in their States and in the nation, and they stabbed me because they were not nominated for the Presidency. Surely they are not worthy to speak of as democrats."

"What do you think of Richard Olney," one of Mr. Bryan's friends said to him. "Olney is all right," replied Mr. Bryan. "He came out for the democratic national platform in 1900. He was a little offside in 1896, but we can easily forgive Olney. Olney is a democrat and he is not afraid of his convictions. He is not a cheat like Cleveland or Hill or Gorman."

It is learned that Miss Sarah Van Allen, youngest daughter of Mr. James J. Van Allen, has been converted to the Catholic religion and there is now no obstacle in the way of her being married to Mr. Robert J. Collier in a Catholic church did she so desire.
