#### HOUSE ROBBED BY A "MOURNER."

With bowed head, as though visited by grief most poignant, a veiled woman Monday afternoon sat through the funeral services of Mrs. Douglas Rollins, at 127 E. street, northeast, Washington. At the close, by an offer of supposed neighborly kindness, the woman secured possession of the key to the dwelling, and in the absence of the family, ransacked in the house for all the valuables it contained. It was shortly after 2 p. m. that the funeral procession bearing the remains of Mrs. Rollins to the Congressional cemetery left the house. All of the sorrowing friends and members of the family occupied carriages in the cortege and Undertaker Tom Spurgeon was momentarily left in charge. The duty of locking the doors and then following the procession had been delegated to him. There were some few women remaining when he turned, with key in hand, to close the house. Tears were softly falling and sobbing was faintly audible, and, though in a hurry, it was with visible reluctance Mr. Spurgeon turned toward the mourners. Before he could address them a woman stepped from one of the parlors, remarking, "You are in haste to lock the house, I see. If you will leave the key with me I will arrange the house before the return of the family." As Mr. Spurgeon hesitated, she added, "I am a neighbor." Without further thought, and in fact without even the slightest suspicion, Mr. Spurgeon handed the woman the key, stating at the time that his man would be up soon to remove chairs furnished for the funeral. He requested of the woman that she let the man in and she promised to do so. When the members of the family returned it was discovered that the house had been robbed.

#### LINEMAN'S AWFUL FLOHT.—J. C. Anderson, a Western Union lineman, was found by people on a passing trolley car, suspended head downward from a pole along the national pike, between Clarysville and Frostburg, Md., yesterday morning. Several passengers almost fainted at the sight. Anderson's foot had caught in the brace of a cross arm at the top of the pole, and he was dangling fifty feet in the air, while blood was dripping from his nose and mouth. A rope was fastened about his body and thrown over the cross arm, and by this means he was lowered, after having been suspended ten minutes. His arm was burned to the bone and his leg was seriously burned, but he will likely recover. The accident was caused by Anderson touching a live wire running from Eckhardt to Hoffman Mine on Western Union poles.

#### To Remove Arc Lights.—Superintendent of Lamps and Lighting McCuen, of Baltimore, has decided to remove 16 arc lights from Mount Royal avenue and the bridges near there and will transfer them to Woodberry avenue, between Green Spring and Railroad avenues, and Railroad avenue between Woodberry and Union avenue. Gas lamps will be substituted on Mount Royal avenue. This action has been taken on account of the electric bugs attracted by the arc lights. Yesterday Mr. McCuen received a letter from a company which offers to exterminate every electric light bug that ever fluttered if given the chance by Mr. McCuen, and is ready to enter into a contract to do so at once. They claim that a powder expressly manufactured by them will rid the city of these bugs and restore peace both to Mr. McCuen and the residents of the city.

#### THE MANY USES OF THE BANANA.—Immense fortunes have been made out of the banana business. Revenues do not accrue alone from the sale of the fruit, for the leaves are used for packing; the juice, being strong in tanning, makes an indelible ink and shoe blacking; the wax found on the underside of the leaves is a valuable article of commerce; manila hemp is made from the stems, and of this hemp are made mats, flannel work and lace handkerchiefs of the finest texture; moreover, the banana is ground into banana flour, which is sold for dessert or ripened by the dry warmth of a drying gas jets in the storage places in which it is kept, and care has to be taken to prevent softening or overripening. The island of Jamaica yields great crops of this useful and money-making fruit.

For Sale.

The City Treasurer will receive sealed bids for the new issue of Alexandria city bonds, of any part thereof, up to and including August 30, 1902.

The denominations of these bonds are as follows: Twenty bonds of one thousand (1,000) dollars each; forty bonds of five hundred (500) dollars each; one hundred bonds of one hundred (100) dollars each, making a total issue of fifty thousand (50,000) dollars.

These are four per cent (4 per cent) coupon bonds, bearing date on July 1, 1902, the interest being payable January 1 and July 1 of each year, and the principal being payable January 1, 1902, and are not taxable by the city.

The issue of these bonds was authorized by an act of the General Assembly of Virginia, approved March 28, 1902, and all the requirements of this act have been fully and strictly observed.

Bids should be addressed to THOMAS W. ROBINSON, City Treasurer, Alexandria, Va., and should be marked "Bid for City Bonds." All bids will be opened at 11 o'clock a. m. on Monday, September 1, 1902, and the right is reserved to reject any and all bids.

In making bids the accumulated interest from July 1, 1902, should be taken into consideration.

A certified check for 3 per cent of the par value of the bonds shall be enclosed with each bid, which sum shall be forfeited to the city of Alexandria in case of refusal or omission on the part of the successful bidder to accept the bonds and make payment for the same within two weeks after the awarding of the same.
