River Notes.

Capt. James Geoghegan, formerly commander of Potomac river steamers, will command the ice boat Latrobe in Baltimore harbor this winter.

The schooner Hanson P. Baines, loaded with shingles from North Carolina, has arrived at 5:30 a. m.

The schooner Ada Ballenger, owned by Alderman Ballenger, has been handsomely repainted and prepared for the fall oyster running trade on the Potomac.

The work of deepening the water over the Mattawoman shoals near Indian Head, is progressing rapidly, and the channel, 200 feet wide and 24 feet deep, will be completed in a few days.

The extension season will close this week. The number of people transported to and from the different resorts has been larger than during many previous years.

The barge Satic, from Baltimore with fertilizer for W. A. Smoot and Co., has arrived.

Mr. James Riley shipped a large number of rockfish and perch caught in Ocequan Bay to the North yesterday.

Black bass are said to be biting again in Ocequan Bay. A lady landed several fine specimens yesterday.

The Nelson Case Postponed.

As has been stated in the Gazette, the Nelson arson case, which was before the County Court the whole of last week, terminated yesterday morning, when the jury was dismissed by Judge Love because of their inability to agree.

Judge Love postponed the case until September 22. Arguments for counsel on the application for the release of Nelson on bail will be heard Thursday.

John Tighe, the alleged accomplice of Nelson in burning the Jackson City gambling houses, will be tried next Monday.

It is said that if Nelson is acquitted on the charge of having burned the house owned by Sanderson and Foster, he will not be tried on the other nine indictments found against him by the grand jury.

Middle of the Street. Persons who have residences on Alfred street from King to Queen, as well as many pedestrians who pass along that street at night use the roadway in preference to the sidewalks.

A great many trees line each side of the street and in places meet. This has the effect of giving a good light on the vitrified brick. The electric lights at the corner of King and Queen appear more brilliant than they really are.

Many of the sidewalks are not of the best; hence the use of the roadway. Nothing has been done as to the parking or placing the pavements where the pavements ought to go.

Council by an ordinance approved November 14, 1901, provided for "parking on streets thirty-two feet or less from curb to curb," but hedged it about with what some consider foolish conditions.

This street was to be made an object lesson in improved street work, and can be if the property-owners show the progressive spirit which it is said now has possession of our citizens.

For the roadway, of course, is much used for street traffic and does not, for reasons that are obvious, present the best of appearance and, not as a resident says, until there is put in use horseless vehicles or fleshless, inanimate hordes, cows, etc., or the street forces use brooms and carts twice or three times a week, which will not be done, improved streets require attention, and require it all the time.
