OPINIONS ON THE STRIKE.

The Philadelphia Record today prints an interview on the coal strike with President Roosevelt, who passed through Philadelphia yesterday on his way to Washington. The President is quoted as follows: "I am grieved beyond measure at the difficulty in Pennsylvania and other coal producing States over the wage and kindred questions." "What remedy is at hand?" he was asked. "There is a remedy," said the President. "Do you mean that the government of the United States can interfere, other than as a law-preserving body?" "No," replied the President, emphatically. "What can be done?" was then asked. "I would refer you to the men at the head of the republican party who are in control of affairs in the State of Pennsylvania. I am sure that their conservative opinion of the difficulties rampant will ultimately result in an amicable settlement of this great question. Of course, politics does not enter into the mining problem, yet I sincerely hope that the republican principles, which are framed alike for high and low, will level the problem to an equality."

Senator Platt yesterday repeated his assertion that the coal strike would be settled in a fortnight from last Saturday, when the representatives of the coal companies reiterated that the strikers were not to be settled at except by the strikers returning to work. Senator Platt was seen in the afternoon at his office in New York. "The strike will be settled in two weeks," he said. "How is it going to be settled? Is either side going to give way?" he was asked. "I will not say, but I stand by my original statement on the subject," he replied. Mr. Platt would not say on what he based his assertion. He said he had not talked with Senator Quay at any time regarding the coal strike, and had no intention of conferring with him on the subject. The officials of the coal carrying companies declared that Mr. Platt made these statements on his own responsibility. An official of the Delaware, Lackawana, and Western Railroad said: "Mr. Platt has put the end of the strike back at least two weeks by his utterances. Matters were improving at the mines, but this gives the miners another false hope that the operators may make some concessions."

JUMPED FROM A WINDOW.

Driven insane by suffering, William James Kinnard, for years property clerk of Bellevue Hospital, New York, yesterday morning hurled himself from the window of his home and, striking the pavement, died instantly. Kinnard was sixty years old, and several times recently threatened to take his life, and his wife, who is only twenty-three years old, kept a close watch on him. He was a paralytic, able to move about only in an invalid chair. Yesterday morning early he managed to crawl out of bed and wheel himself to the window. Then, climbing on the sill, he threw himself head foremost to the street below. His wife knew nothing of the tragedy until the janitor and a policeman with several men bearing Kinnard's body on a stretcher, pounded on the door of the apartment and awakened her. An hour or so later the woman was found in a hysterical condition in her rooms. She was unable to control herself and had to be cared for by neighbors. Kinnard during the last few months had been unable to perform his duties at Bellevue. A stroke of paralysis had rendered him almost helpless. His suffering and inability to work preyed on his mind. Frequently he said, according to his wife, that he would kill himself, but had never before actually attempted to do so.

ATTEMPTED MURDER.

A dispatch from Lynch's station, Va., says: "A dastardly attempt at what looked like murder occurred near here last Sunday night. Mr. Walter Hughes, of Evington, had accompanied Miss Wood, daughter of Mr. C. H. Wood, to night services at Lynch's. "When Mr. Hughes left Mr. Wood's house, after their return from church, he had to cross a covered bridge over Otter river. Two unknown men attacked him on the bridge, and when found by Mr. Wood and his sons Mr. Hughes was lying between the buggy and the side of the bridge in a semi-conscious condition. Mr. Wood removed him to his home, which was near, and took him to his own home next day. Mr. Wood says five shots were fired, but neither struck Mr. Hughes. His injuries were from the fall from his buggy. His assailants and their motive are unknown. Mr. Hughes remembers that in the darkness he saw two men on the bridge, and only remembers hearing one shot, while others were mere five shots fired in quick succession."
