## MURDER LIKE BORGIA'S.

A dispatch from Rome says that the  
Count Comarnini murder is now monopol-  
izing the attention of all Italy. It  
recalls in its horrid cruelty and deprav-  
ity the historic tragedies associated with  
the Italian tyrants in the dark ages.

Count Bonmartini, a wealthy, nobleman,  
married Zolindina, the handsome,  
well-dowered daughter of Professor Au-  
gusto Murri, a medical man of European  
celebrity. Zolindina is a typical Italian,  
passionate and ungovernable, and even  
at the time she was married to Bonmar-  
tini, though only 19, she had developed  
a morbid taste for sensational and vicious  
literature, obtained for her by her broth-  
er Zullo, a medical student, known in  
Bologna as a young man of singularly  
dissolute character.

Zullo's influence over his sister was  
always exercised for evil, and after her  
marriage he did all in his power to en-  
rage her from her husband, having also  
got her father to prevent her marriage  
to a young friend of his own, with  
whom she had fallen in love.

Zolindina in her strength of mind and  
surroundings and propensities seems to  
be the reincarnation of Lucrezia Borgia,  
as pictured by some of the mediaeval  
chroniclers. She had numerous admir-  
ers after her marriage, and 12 months  
ago her husband, a patient, forgiving  
man, separated from her. She had two  
children, but Bologna rang with stories  
of her amours, and she was literally a  
public scandal.

Professor Murri never rested until he  
brought about an apparent reconcilia-  
tion between his daughter and her hus-  
band, and with the children the couple  
went together to Venice for the summer.  
After a few weeks the trouble broke out  
again in the household, and Bonmartini  
resolved to settle in Padua, in the hope  
of removing his wife from bad influ-  
ences. He left Venice the 25th of  
August and deposited a large sum of  
money in the bank at Padua, intending  
to buy property near that town.

He then went to Bologna, where he  
was seen by several friends, afterward  
quietly going to his home, a house in  
the Via Mazzini. Three days later the  
other inmates of the houses, suspecting  
something, broke into Bonmartini's  
apartment, and found him lying on the  
floor in a pool of coagulated blood.  
His throat was cut and there were 17  
dagger wounds on his body. The apart-  
ment was in disorder, and some  
feminine wearing apparel was found,  
giving the impression, which Zullo  
originated, that the Count had been  
murdered through jealousy over some  
disgraceful intrigue.

No clue to the murder could be ob-  
tained, and Zullo, after defaming his  
brother-in-law broadcast, sent a wreath  
to his funeral and disappeared. Suspi-  
cion was aroused when the police re-  
ceived a letter from Professor Murri  
stating that Zullo had committed the  
murder to avenge his sister, who accused  
Bonmartini of ill-treating her. In-  
quiries then elicited not only abundant  
proofs of Zullo's mad hatred and  
jealousy of his brother-in-law, but he  
had also been in great mono-  
tary difficulties, having tried,  
through the instrumentality of Doctor  
Naldi, a man of evil reputation, and a  
gambling, to get a loan of \$1000. Naldi  
was himself without means until the  
day after the Count's disappearance,  
when he paid some debts and left hur-  
riedly for Genoa.

It is now known that the Countess  
sent the key of the Count's house to  
Zullo from Venice, and he with Naldi,  
who has confessed, lay in wait for him.  
While Zullo pinned the victim, stiff-  
ing his cries, Naldi inflicted several  
death-dealing blows with a large knife.  
They then robbed the murdered man  
and coolly arranged things to make it  
appear that the Count was the victim of  
a guilty intrigue.

It was found that the Countess had  
telegraphed Zullo tidings of her hus-  
band's movements and of the money she  
imagined he had with him, and the cli-  
max of the sensation was reached when  
she was arrested at her father's house as  
an accomplice in the diabolical crime.  
Since her arrest she has abandoned  
the pose of a bereaved widow, and  
adopted an attitude of revolting cyni-  
cism. Zullo is still at large, but it is  
believed he is in Bologna, while Naldi  
was trapped after vainly attempting to  
hire as a surgeon on an American-bound  
ship from Genoa. As a revelation of  
callous brutality, as well as incredible  
moral degradation, the story of Zolindina  
and Zullo could not be excelled.

HICKS FOR OCTOBER.  
October will begin with reactionary  
storms of rain, and possibly snow to the  
north, passing eastward over the coun-  
try. New moon on the 1st will cause  
higher temperature, with electrical  
storms, high tides and probably seismic  
disturbances on touching that date, but  
cold gales from the northwest with rising  
barometer will follow quickly. During  
the Vulcan storm period, 4th to 9th,  
the weather will grow decidedly warmer.

beginning in western parts and moving  
eastward, the barometer will fall at the  
same time; and cloudiness and rain will  
follow touching most parts of the country  
in their eastward progress about Sunday  
the 5th to Wednesday the 9th. Storms  
of this period promise to be general and  
severe, with great probability of wintry  
aspects in all northerly directions. Snow  
with heavy sleet are entirely probable,  
followed by high barometer and cold.  
The Mercury period is central on the  
10th and continues to the 16th. Much  
cloudiness with drizzle and sleet are re-  
sults to be expected during much of the  
Mercury period. A rise in temperature  
and rain and snow storms of increased  
extent and snow will be natural on and  
touching the 12th and 13th.

The Vulcan storm period, central on  
the 17th and covering the 15th to 20th,  
is within the Venus period, with Moon  
on the celestial equator on the 15th, at  
a total eclipse node on the 16th, and at  
perigee and greatest north declination  
on the 19th and 20th. Without the least  
desire to be sensational, we will say  
that severe and dangerous autumnal  
storms and tides are very probable at  
this period. Rain, snow and sleet will  
visit most interior sections, and a big  
October cold wave and very high barom-  
eter will wind up the period.

Reaction to much warmer, with falling  
barometer and more rain, turning to  
snow northward, will be natural results  
on and touching the 23rd and 24th. All  
these October periods will end in more  
or less storminess with stiff, cold gales  
over the great lakes and the northwest  
generally. By the middle of the month  
the boreal waves and frosts will reach  
quite to the gulf regions.

The last five days of the month are  
covered by a regular storm period, blend-  
ed with the Venus disturbance at its  
center, with Moon on the celestial equator  
on the 27th and new again on the 31st.  
The indications are that storms tropical  
in kind, with thunder and rain south-  
ward, will come during the first develop-  
ments of this period.
