



"BIGGEST MAN ON EARTH."

J. Pierpont Morgan's personality as representing trusts was dwelt on Sunday night in a sermon on "The Biggest Man on Earth—Is He Dangerous?" delivered by Rev. Dr. Louis Albert Banks in Grace Methodist Episcopal Church in New York.

"Goliath of Gath," said Dr. Banks, "was called the giant of his day because he was 10 1/2 feet high and could carry a spear whose staff was like a weaver's beam. He was the biggest man on earth in his time, because he had the largest physical girth, the longest arms and the strongest muscles. He made a nation tremble and an army run like cowards. But fashions change in giants as in other things. Our giant is of a different type. He has laid his hold on the Atlantic ocean and holds the great steamship lines in his fist. He has taken the great iron mines and steel furnaces into his control in the most gigantic of organizations. He grasps the coal mines in that same mighty hand. He has mastery over great groups of railroads until his world is law in the railway world. When this modern giant goes abroad the earth trembles under his feet. Emperors, Czars, Kings and Presidents hasten to dine him and do him honor. The Premier of the British Empire makes international compacts with him as with any other great world power. We have just had an exhibition at home of the power of the giant. When everything else had failed to settle the coal strike the President sent the Secretary of War to hunt up the giant and beg of him as a favor that he would stop the coal strike, and in 48 hours it was done. This modern giant must be taken seriously. Directly or indirectly he controls the wages of millions of men and decides how much food and comfort shall be realized by the millions of women and children. Whether the people shall pay for fuel or not and what price they shall pay for it waits on the fiat of his word. It is hard to state the power of this giant without being accused of exaggeration. One can hardly conceive of the possibility of any man being nominated by any great political party and elected to the presidency of the United States if opposed by the giant. No wonder he is a greater man than the President, since he can make and unmake Presidents. No sane man can doubt that the giant and the conditions which breed the giant are dangerous and full of threatening against free institutions. Our fathers never dreamed of placing such enormous power in single hands. Already the government is changing from a republic with a President to a moneyed aristocracy with an autocratic giant at the head. Let every patriotic, public-spirited man or woman study how to purge the nation of the conditions which breed the giant."

BURNED AT THE STAKE.—Charles Young, the negro charged with assaulting and afterward murdering Mrs. Ed Lewis, white, was burned at Forest City, Ark., last night by a mob of infuriated citizens. Sheriff W. E. Williams used every effort against this measure and had telephoned Judge Huttler, who promised to give immediate trial for the negro. In view of this the leaders of the mob, it is said, had given the sheriff positive pledges that they would await the trial and take no violent measures. Later, however, more violent counsel prevailed, and at about 8:30 o'clock last night the mob marched to the county jail. After having refused the keys by Deputy Sheriff Murphy, until Sheriff Williams could be acquainted with their demands, the mob, not waiting for Sheriff Williams' arrival, forcibly took the cell keys from Murphy, and, breaking into the cell doors with sledgehammers, took the prisoner from his cell against the protest and pleadings of Sheriff Williams, who had arrived in the meantime. The mob took the negro to a point about half a mile east of town, bound him, piled wood around him, and set fire to it. The negro begged piteously for his life, but the mob turned deaf ears to his pleadings. In a short time the flames reached him, and he expired in the presence of the several hundred men composing the mob. After Young had been put to death the mob started in quest of another negro alleged to have been implicated in the killing of Mrs. Lewis. At midnight he had not been found.

MURDER AND SUICIDE.—Marian Nolan, the beautiful girl who gained a national reputation as the model for the well-known statue of Venus, was shot dead in San Francisco last evening, by Edward Marshutta, a stenographer in an insurance office. The two were seen quarreling on the street. The woman was heard to say: "You will follow me, will you?" At the same time she hit him over the head with her umbrella. As she drew back to hit him a second time he drew a pistol and fired. She

dropped to the sidewalk. He turned the revolver on himself, and fired dying in a few minutes. The woman expired soon after being taken to the hospital. Marshutta had been seen much lately with Marian Nolan, and the girl's father had remonstrated with him over his frequent visits to the house. Marian Nolan first came in to prominence during the California Midwinter Fair. Her picture was in the papers, and this notoriety, prompted her to enter the beauty contest as the model for a statue of the California Venus. She won the prize. Then she went on the stage, and had ambitions to become an actress, but it was soon found she could not act. Finally she attracted Don Fernando Cabrera, a wealthy Spaniard from the City of Mexico, who spanied her his wife. After a few months she secured a divorce from Cabrera, who was insanely jealous. She went to New York where she was a favorite in the studios. Recently she returned to her old home.

ANOTHER REVOLUTION.—The Navy Department yesterday received a dispatch from Commander Newton E. Mason, of the cruiser Cincinnati, dated Cape Haitien, Haiti, October 19, in which he says that the United States consul at Monte Cristo, San Domingo, reports that a revolution has been begun in the Dominican Republic. Commander Mason said he would go to Monte Cristo, where revolutionary disturbances have already occurred, and later in the day he reported sailing for that place. Monte Cristo is a town of about 3,000 inhabitants, situated thirty miles east of Cape Haitien. In the same dispatch Commander Mason was able to report that the Haitian government was in possession of Gonaives, the capital of General Firmin, leader of the Haitian revolution, from which he fled on October 15, taking passage on a steamer for Mathewtown, Bahama Islands.

HIS CURE FOR CONSUMPTION.—Dr. George D. Barney, of Brooklyn, who announced that he had inoculated Miss Emma King with tuberculosis germs several months ago to prove that consumption was curable, has now given to the world his formula for healing the disease. In a report that he will make to the Medical Journal in a few days is the statement that within the last year 47 cases were cured. The only medicine used is composed of the three cresols, para, meta and ortho, made into one compound.

Added to the cresols is one of the strongest disinfectants known to science—ethylenediamine. These, made into one liquid, form what is known to the medical world as cresamin, a strong disinfectant.

Dr. Barney places the patient in a steel air-tight cabinet and supplies to the patient air that has been charged with the medicine by a vaporizer.
