DEMOCRATIC RALLY.

Meeting at the Opera House Tonight.—Senator Daniel and Representative Rixey Announced to Make Speeches. Arrangements for the democratic mass meeting at the Opera House tonight have been perfected and an interesting occasion is anticipated by all who purpose to attend.

Gas in Engine Houses.

The action of the committee on light in calling attention to the large amount of gas consumed in the engine houses, and which was referred to the Board of Fire Warden by the City Council on Tuesday night is to be commended. It was one step in gradual and proper economy in the management of the gas works which was promised the people last April when it was also promised that business principles and not sentiment would be the order on the completion of the new works.

Reductions at Southern Depot.

The building of the new round house, carpenters' shop, power house and paint shop at the Southern Railway depot in this city, the increase of the number of mechanics and apprentices and the removal of the offices from Charlottesville to Alexandria had caused considerable satisfaction heretofore; but, like many other acts of capricious Fortune, that fickle one has, it is feared, sent a frost upon the work. It was stated a few days ago that material reductions were being made in the number of office employees and that the force of carpenters was to be depleted. It is hoped that this was merely a temporary movement and that in a short time all would again be at work.

Opera House.

The popular favorites, Conroy, Mack and an excellent company will be the attraction at the Opera House all next week, opening Monday next with the comedy drama, "In Dixie's Land." Among the other plays to be presented are "Her Father's Crime," "A Woman of the World," "Dangers of New York," "A Woman's Love," "A Daughter of Cuba," etc.

Very sensibly they realize their impotence in the face of the democratic tidal wave which is sure to rush over the Eighth Congressional district next week.

New Wharf.

The new wharf now being constructed by Mr. J. W. Hammond in front of the Mutual Ice Company's plant, foot of Cameron street, will add considerable to the appearance of the river front. It is 129 feet wide and will be composed almost entirely of earth. The unsightly islands, remnants of previous piers, which had for many years been a menace to navigation, have been incorporated into the new wharf. It is again suggested that a movement should be inaugurated toward removing the sunken piles in front of the outlet lock of the old canal, as well as the hull of an old barge sunk in the same locality years ago. This obstruction extends into the channel and lies in a position to form mud banks and shoal water nearby.
