LETTER FROM PAGE.
[Correspondence of the Alexandria Gazette.]
Luray, Va., Nov. 1, 1902.

The improvement in our town has steadily progressed for some years, and Luray would hardly be recognized by those who have not been here lately. This improvement is of a striking, permanent character. We now have two national banks both doing well, the one owing its own property, and the other about to build a fine edifice on Main street, corner of Water. The old bridge spanning the Hawkbill, the driving line between East and West Luray has been torn down, and a new iron one will take its place. The Caverns still draw their annual number of visitors, some ten thousand a year, and this grand work of nature is always new, grand and interesting, and will stay with us as a drawing feature in years to come, as it has in the past. Skyland on the summit of Stony Man, in the Blue Ridge, has just closed one of its best and most prosperous seasons, and will in years to come be one of the most attractive mountain resorts in the State. While we note these gratifying evidences of thrift, there are other improvements that we hope may soon be made our bad roads and lack of bridges across our streams, especially over the Shenandoah river. Throughout its thirty odd miles of course through Page, there is not one single bridge to speed the traveler, or safeguard his passage across its waters. The Gem Furnace near Shenandoah City is again in full blast turning out a fine quality of iron. This furnace is now owned by the Empire Steel and Iron Company, has been operated for seventy-five years at intervals, and was once owned by Wm. Milnes, Congressman from this district in 1872.

The Virginia Consolidated Copper Company composed of Pennsylvania and other capitalists are now rejecting over the success that has crowned their labors and expenditure of money. A shaft begun two years ago near the base of the Blue Ridge, on Hooks mountain, has now reached 125 feet, and several veins of paying copper have been passed through.

New and improved mining machinery is now up and ready to work. Some \$20,000 has already been spent, but so secure does the company feel in its work and that they have found the best copper mine in this part of the United States, that the work will go on. This vein of copper has long been traced in different sections here, but this is the first shaft ever dug to such a depth. This success has agitated the subject of copper among our people.

The wheat is looking finely here, and the late rains have given it an excellent start.

CULPEPER BONDS (SVO. FEB.)—Judge C. E. Nicol, sitting in chambers at Manassas yesterday, heard the application of Green et al. for an injunction restraining the board of supervisors of Culpeper county from issuing bonds in favor of the Fredericksburg and Rappahannock Railroad Company. The ground of the application was based on the allegation that Judge William L. Jeffreys, the judge who ordered the election that authorized the bond issue, was interested in the construction company claimed to be connected with the railroad, and therefore such election was illegal. Judge Nicol, after examining a mass of testimony and the hearing of elaborate argument, dismissed the application for an injunction. The case will be immediately taken to the Supreme Court of Appeals of Virginia. The applicants were represented by Hon. John L. Jeffreys, of Norfolk, and T. Raleigh Green of Culpeper. The railroad company was represented by Barbour & Rixey, of Culpeper.

FILLED NEGRO WITH BULLETS—Sam Harris, a negro, entered the home of George Meadows, a prominent planter, who lives six miles south of Salem, Ala., yesterday morning during Mr. Meadows' absence, and with an axe struck his wife and eighteen-year-old daughter each on the head, crushing Mrs. Meadows' skull and fracturing that of the daughter. Mrs. Meadows has never regained consciousness and will die. The negro was placed in custody and held till Miss Meadows had sufficiently recovered to identify him. This she did yesterday afternoon, and the negro was taken in charge by about 125 armed men and his body riddled with bullets. He denied his guilt until the first shot was fired, when he acknowledged the crime. His purpose was robbery.

MILLIONAIRE TO BE ARRESTED.

A dispatch from Boston says that State Detective George H. Dunham last night said that he would arrest, as "Jack the Sluggard," a Boston millionaire manufacturer, whose firm is known in every city and town in the country. The specific charge against the man will be the murder of Clara Morton, an attaché of the McLean Asylum, in Waverly, last Saturday. The police, however, claim that they have other cases against him. The arrest will create the greatest sensation known in criminal and in social circles in Boston in many years, the accused man being also prominent in the society. The State police assert that they are able to fasten the murder of Clara Morton in Waverly on him indisputably, and they are said to be in possession of positive evidence that he is the perpetrator of the whole series of outrages which have terrorized the suburbs of Boston during the past few months. He was seen in Waverly, it is said, on Saturday night by five witnesses who know him well, and he is charged with attempting an assault earlier in the evening, when he was recognized. More than this, his description, it is alleged, has been recognized in one other "slugging" case as the guilty person. The suspect has been an inmate of McLean Asylum and also of the Butler Hospital in Providence. His disease has been diagnosed as melancholia, and several times his case had assumed a violent form. Before this he has been detected in attacks on women, and the police say they have collected a mass of evidence against him. Miss Clara Morton was attacked on the ground of the McLean Asylum in Waverly on Saturday night. The highest surgical skill was called in an attempt to save her life at the Massachusetts General Hospital, where she died without having regained consciousness. That the crime was committed for revenge is not believed for a moment. Miss Morton was a young woman of the highest character, without an enemy in the world. She would go out of her way to avoid words or a dispute, and made many friends. The only other motive that can be conceived by the police is that the murder was committed by a maniac. The time and place of the assault would indicate that the assailant was more or less familiar with the hospital. At 8:50 p. m. many of the night nurses would be coming up the hill to go on duty at 9 o'clock, and the spot chosen for the assault was the darkest part of a very dark avenue.
