LOCAL NEWS.

WEATHER PROBABILITIES.—For this section rain tonight; clearing early Tuesday morning; fresh east to southeast winds, becoming westerly.

Saturday Night Disturbances.

A crowd was attracted on King street, between Fairfax and Royal, Saturday night, by trouble between a small boy and a Greek fruit dealer.

About midnight Saturday night a dispute took place between two young men in a saloon and later the two met in Market alley and engaged in a fight.

A young man, a stranger hereabouts, was fined \$10 this morning for flourishing a pistol on north Lee street Saturday night.

Some excitement was caused in the northern part of the city Saturday night by a colored man who whipped his wife in the alley bounded by Patrick, Alfred, Oranoco and Princess streets.

The Dix Case.

As was stated Saturday, George W. Dix, charged with embezzling money belonging to Osceola Tribe of Red Men, was sent to jail to await the action of the grand jury of the January term of the Corporation Court.

Growing Demand for Houses.

There is still a growing demand for suitable dwelling houses in Alexandria. Real estate dealers have for a long time been unable to meet the requirements, and one gentleman engaged in the renting and sale of houses remarked Saturday night to some of his friends that he could have rented twelve houses that day.

Fined for Trespass.

Three men who pass most of their time in the neighborhood of Cameron and Fairfax streets were arrested Saturday night by Officers Bettis, Knight and Garvey charged with trespassing upon the City Hotel property.

Interchange of Pulpits.

Dr. Hunt, of the Baptist Church, occupied the pulpit of the M. E. Church South last night and Rev. Mr. Stump preached in the Baptist Church. This interchange of pulpits is the inauguration of a movement begun by church people recently to afford an opportunity for church members to hear and become acquainted with all the ministers of the city.

The Churches.

There were average congregations at the various churches at both the morning and evening services yesterday. The services were conducted according to the announcement made in Saturday's Gazette.

Protests from Insurance Agents.

The agents of insurance companies in this city have entered formal complaint against the manner in which electricity is being introduced into houses in Alexandria for illuminating purposes or for furnishing motive power.

The Weather.

The weather yesterday was again mild and fair, and the pleasant conditions brought many people on the streets. Numbers came here from Washington, as is generally the case on fair Sundays.

THE FAYETTE STREET DEPOT.

New Structure Wanted in Alexandria—Main Artery of Travel Between North and South Represented by Small Wooden Building—Fayette Street Gorged With Trains.

While the Pennsylvania Railroad Company is making preparations to expend \$5,000,000 in improvements on the Northern Central Railway, their attention should again be called to the frame structure called a station which has for the past quarter of a century represented this great corporation in Alexandria, through which city the main railway artery between the North and South lies.

It would be necessary to fence the tracks and have gates at each intersection. Then trains could pass quickly and the discomfort would be minimized.

Besides there would be no opportunity afforded mischievous boys of endangering their lives by hanging on passing trains.

It is said that the company is willing to pave the street like King street for the privilege described above, and it could doubtless be induced to erect a more commodious and modern station also.

Some people living on Fayette, however, for reasons best known to themselves prefer present conditions to a double track, but how any more annoyance, discomfort or damage could be experienced than exists at present is hard to see.

As recently stated in the Gazette an opportunity was lost in the action of the city with the electric railway in not allowing the company to double-track King street.

Should the Pennsylvania Railroad Company offer the same terms for like privileges on Fayette street and they be rejected, it is believed another mistake will be made which will eventually be the cause of the railroad company going around Alexandria, as the time is as hand when one track is not sufficient to meet the increased demands of traffic.

Should this be the outcome, the policy of the company owning the road is never to relinquish a franchise once acquired, and the present track will be kept on Fayette street, probably for the convenience of cattle, freight or garbage trains.

The marriage of Miss Laura Mulhall, daughter of Captain Mulhall, to Lieut. E. S. Sayre, Twenty-first United States Infantry, occurred at 7:30 o'clock on Saturday night in the Presbyterian church at Ballston, Alexandria county. Chaplain Pierce, Second Cavalry, officiated.

The United States dispatch boat Mayflower passed by this city this morning on her way to Washington. The Mayflower arrived off Quantico early last night where she anchored until early this morning. The steamer was on her return trip from Hampton Roads.
