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A WOMAN'S STORY.

Disclosures of three alleged plots to assassinate the President since he has taken office were made in Hoboken, N. J., yesterday by Mrs. Lena Dexheimer, the mother of six children, a parishioner of the First Methodist Episcopal Church in Hoboken, and, according to her account, a converted anarchist. Rev. Charles L. Meade, pastor of the First Church, says he is in a position to know that her story is reliable.

Mrs. Dexheimer says the clergyman helped her to frustrate one of the attempts on the President's life. Rev. Meade admitted that this was so, but refused to discuss the part that he had played, saying that he preferred to allow the story Mrs. Dexheimer told of it to suffice.

Mrs. Dexheimer is an intelligent German woman. That she was an anarchist was a secret among herself, her husband, Pastor Meade, and members of the secret society until one day last week. On that occasion she attended a meeting of the Mother's Club at the First Methodist Episcopal Church and unburdened herself in a moment of religious fervor.

"My relations with the anarchists," she said, "began shortly after my marriage, nineteen years ago, when I became acquainted with Emma Goldman, I joined the organization of which she was the leading spirit. Shortly after I joined, Emma Goldman took a trip to Europe and returned with the most violent principles. I continued to attend most of the meetings of the organization until three years ago, when I moved to Hoboken, and happened to attend special services at the First Methodist Episcopal Church one evening, with my husband. Pastor Meade was in the pulpit, and his words so impressed me that I sought him after the services. I told him my story, and assured him that I wanted to give up anarchist associates. He told me to pray, and to see him the next day. I was converted in the course of a few weeks. Although I stopped attending the anarchist meetings, they kept constantly communicating with me. Finally threats began to come through the mail that if I should prove untrue to the oath of the order my life would be in danger. For the sake of my family I made a second peace with the order, and continued to receive the communications sent to trusted members. I received no intimation of the attempt on President McKinley's life, and knew nothing of his assassination until I read it in the newspapers. Shortly after the deed was done, though, I received a notice by mail that an effort would be made to assassinate President Roosevelt at the bi-centennial celebration of Yale at New Haven. The date set was November 15, 1901, and the man selected to do the deed was a Frenchman named Melov. He arrived on a Red Star Line steamer and I met him on the pier with other anarchists. I became friendly with him, and after meeting him several times tried to persuade him not to commit the deed. In the meantime I had let Pastor Meade into the plot, and he got the letter in cipher from me and forwarded it to the New York branch of the secret service. Melov was continually tracked, and was several times on the point of being arrested. My entreaties won him over and he told me he was going to return to Paris and kill himself, as his anarchist associates had told him that either he or the President would have to die. He kept his word. He returned to Paris and killed himself by pretending to accidentally fall under a horse's foot. The record of his death is in possession of the Paris police. The second man selected to kill the President was named Mueller, and he lived at either 143, 145 or 147 avenue B, New York. He committed suicide by taking poison. The third person to draw the lot for the same purpose was a Mrs. Schroeder, who lived somewhere in Harlem. She ended her life in the same manner as Mueller. I got only general announcements of these two plots, and was not told the dates when the attempts would be made on the President's life. The anarchists began to suspect me after the Schroeder woman did away with herself, and spies were kept watching my house in Hoboken. I became fearful of my life, and appealed to Pastor Meade for assistance. He communicated again with the secret service, and detectives followed me every time I left the house to go to church or do marketing. I am no longer afraid of anything. I have come to the conclusion that the anarchists regard it unsafe to interfere with me."



DON'T TALK JOHN CROWNS.—William R. Irwin, a prohibition orator of Williamsport, Pa., has just returned from a trip through West Virginia. While addressing an audience in Prohibition Hall in Williamsport on Sunday night he told of being mobbed in a West Virginia town for a complimentary reference to John Brown, and gave his hearers this advice: "When you go South, let the war alone. You can blow up Jeff Davis all you wish, but don't talk John Brown." Mr. Irwin was addressing a meeting at Charleston, when to illustrate a point, he said: "John Brown was a man who formed convictions, and stood by them. And today thousands of people honor him for it." The Methodist minister who had introduced him led an exodus from the hall. At the house where he was entertained the doors and windows were barricaded to keep out the angry townspeople, and Irwin had to slip secretly out of town, fearing to try to keep two other engagements to speak. "I believe that John Brown is in heaven, but that Methodist minister will never get there," said Mr. Irwin.

RIOTOUS SAILORS.—The London Daily Mail prints an undated dispatch from Madeira, saying that at the recent visit of the American training ship Hartford a hundred of her men were given shore leave for five hours. Some of them became intoxicated and acted riotously. They molested a wagon driver and severely assaulted a prominent resident with sticks whereupon bottles were thrown at them from the windows of the hotel. Some of the Americans received nasty cuts. Later the populace attacked the sailors, who took refuge in a church. The Hartford, according to the "Mail's" correspondent, fired six blank rounds. Subsequently the captain went ashore and promised that the sailors would not receive shore leave again. The story is incomplete in several particulars.
