SEVERE STORMS.

A severe storm of wind and rain swept over a portion of the South yesterday causing considerable loss to property and several casualties. The greatest damage was that to telegraph and telephone wire, communication with some points in the Southwest having been interrupted for the greater part of the day. Southern Louisiana, northern Mississippi, western Tennessee, and southeastern Alabama were the chief sufferers.

The storm struck New Orleans shortly before daylight and blew down the house of Prof. John Derrier, a brother of "Tony" Derrier, a professional clown, probably fatally injuring him. Mrs. Derrier was also seriously injured. The storm also was very severe in the vicinity of Clayton, Ala., where trees were uprooted and houses blown down. It is feared that loss of life and serious losses among live stock may be reported when full details of the damage are received.

A destructive windstorm swept over northern Mississippi and western Tennessee about noon yesterday, causing considerable loss of property. No fatalities are reported. The velocity of the wind reached a maximum of fifty-two miles an hour. Reports from the surrounding country state that heavy damage to telegraph and telephone wires has been experienced and communication with southern points is in a demoralized condition. At Memphis several small boats in the harbor suffered damage, the smokestacks of two steamers having been destroyed by the force of the gale. The storm followed the river from the Arkansas and its effects were not felt in Memphis and its vicinity.

A disastrous wind and rainstorm swept over a portion of the country five miles south of Clayton, Ala., yesterday morning. Telegraph and telephone wires beyond Clayton are down and reports are meager. The storm was most severe around Pratt's Station and Baker Hill. Eastern and central Nebraska yesterday afternoon and last night experienced the first heavy snowfall of the season. It was wet and hard on unprotected stock, but has not drifted enough to interfere with traffic.

A severe snowstorm reached Cheyenne, Wyo., and is moving south before a high wind. The temperature has fallen to zero.

ANTI-IMPERIALISTIC LEAGUE.

On the occasion of the annual meeting of the New England Anti-Imperialist League at the Twentieth Century Club in Boston yesterday a luncheon was given in which some two hundred ladies and gentlemen participated. Former Gov. Boutwell presided, and in opening he spoke of the growth of the anti-imperialist movement, and said that the only way to overthrow the imperialistic tendency of the administration was by the overthrow of the republican party.

Erving Winslow, the secretary, said: "The more important correspondence of the office has been with members of Congress, district committee platform makers, and congressional candidates of the democratic party, with the aim of strengthening the attitude which that party has taken upon anti-imperialism. To the minority of the Senate committee on the Philippines, Senators Rawlins, Dubois, Culberson, Patterson, and Carmack especially, sincere appreciation and deep gratitude are due." While the democratic party in Congress was moving toward a satisfactory attitude upon the question in which we are concerned, we were invited to share in its councils, and had some little influence in bringing about the bill offered in the Senate as a substitute for that of the Phil majority for the government of the Philippines. We desire to continue our work with unabated zeal and energy, looking to the education of the people before the presidential election, and while we wish we might hope that it would bring about a reformation of the party in power, the most sanguine must now acknowledge that the drift within that party is too strong for us to expect it, and that it is probable that the republican party must be destroyed, or at least it must be disintegrated before imperialism can be overturned.

Treasurer Haskins told of the contributions to the funds of the league, mentioning \$1,000 from Mr. Carnegie, and said that a great deal more is needed to carry on the work and to educate the mind and awaken the conscience of the voters? on the questions at issue. Officers were re-elected, Mr. Boutwell continuing as president. While the ballot was being taken Edward B. Smith, of Chicago, spoke. He arraigned the policy of the republican party in the Philippines, which he characterized as "the grossest betrayal of principles of representative government."
