STORM ON THE COAST.

The observer of the Weather Bureau at Hatteras, N. C., reports that the four-masted schooner Wesley M. Oler went ashore at Hatteras Inlet life-saving station early yesterday morning during the storm. She was pounding in the surf about a mile off shore until 8:20 a. m., when the foremast went over, carrying probably the last man. Almost immediately the vessel went to pieces. The life-saving crew could do nothing to save the crew. No bodies have washed ashore yet.

Reports received in Norfolk last night are to the effect that not a soul of the ill-fated Wesley M. Oler's crew escaped the disaster which wrecked that schooner. Only one chance of a rescue is known, and that was brought to light by the German steamer Kohn, from Bremen to Baltimore, reporting the crew of an abandoned schooner aboard while entering the Capes yesterday.

Yesterday morning's hurricane blew sixty miles at Norfolk. The three-masted schooners William D. Hilton and Melville Phillips, together with several smaller craft, were blown ashore in the harbor and lower bay. The tug Underwriter, which was towing the Oler from Nassau, has not been heard from and fears are entertained that she foundered in the gale. The crew of the schooner Ida Lawrence abandoned that vessel in a rudderless condition off Hatteras early yesterday morning and was rescued with the greatest difficulty by life-savers.

Capt. Langreiter, of the German steamer Kohn, bound from Bremen for Baltimore, signalled as the vessel passed Cape Henry station: "We have crew saved from the abandoned W. H. T. D." The signal letters were recognized.

The terrific storm of wind and rain that struck Newport News and vicinity yesterday morning was the most destructive known in Hampton Roads in some time. One life was lost and numerous boats have been torn loose from their moorings and beached. Others firmly anchored have been filled and sunk. The only victim known so far is a colored man who was drowned near Minch's store, in Warwick county. He was in a sloop, and the rope holding the jibboom broke, allowing it to swing around. The boom struck the negro, knocking him overboard.

EMPEROR ADDRESSES WORKINGMEN.

Emperor William, addressing a deputation of workmen at Breslau, Prussia, yesterday, made a bitter anti-socialist speech, declaring it a lie that workmen had to rely on the socialist party for a betterment of their position. The socialist, he added, had terrorized and trod the workingmen under foot, and as men of honor they must have no more to do with them. The presence of the workingmen, Emperor William maintained, showed they had not disappointed him in the expectation he expressed at Essen, and had helped to keep free from reproach the memory of his friend, the late Herr Krupp. The workingmen were always the object of deep interest and solicitude to the Emperor. Therefore, he was justified in addressing a word of warning to the workmen. For years they had let themselves be led by agitators and socialists under the delusion that they must belong to that party if they wished to better their position. That, the Emperor said, was a great lie and a serious mistake. The agitators had tried to stir up the workingmen against their employers, against other classes, and against the throne and altar, and at the same time they had most unscrupulously exploited, terrorized, and enslaved them in order to strengthen their own power, not for the promotion of the welfare of the workingmen, but in order to show hatred between the classes and disseminate cowardly slanders, from which nothing, not even the grandest quality, the honor of German manhood, remained immune, and with which people the working classes should not have anything to do. The Emperor concluded by asking the deputation to send one of their comrades, a simple, unpretending man from the workshop, into the national parliament. Such a man would be gladly welcomed as a working representative of the German working classes. The representatives of other classes would willingly work together with such representatives, however many there might be.
