PRIEST TO WED.

For love of a woman legally bound to another Father Charles McNelis, until recently assistant to Father Dunn, rector of St. Titus' Church, in Titusville, Pa., has given up a career in the church. Although locked up on the technical charge of vagrancy brought to separate the couple, he maintained that he will never resume his priestly functions, will remain a loyal son of the church, but will marry the woman as soon as it can be done with the sanction of the civil authorities.

Father T. A. Hendrick, rector of St. Bridget's, church, one of the most prominent Catholic priests of the city, caused the arrest of Father McNelis, who has been unable to secure \$1,000 bail, and will try habeas corpus proceedings on today. Father McNelis is 28 years old, with finely chiseled features and a ruddy complexion. He speaks in a musical voice, is a fluent, graceful talker and is well dressed. Since leaving the priesthood he has grown a moustache of light brown color.

"Yes," said Father McNelis yesterday, "there is a woman in the case, if you would use the term. I would rather be a lay member of the church than a priest leading the life of a hypocrite."

"I was born in Philadelphia 28 years ago. I was educated in the church schools and received my priestly education in Germantown Seminary. From boyhood I did not believe that my vocation was the priesthood, but my brother and my friends urged me on."

"Four years ago I was ordained in Philadelphia and was sent to St. Titus' Church, in Titusville, to be assistant to Father Dunn, also having charge of small mission work."

"I met Mrs. May Fleming in Titusville, Pa. She is a convert to the church and the wife of James Fleming, who is in the oil business. He is not wealthy, but has a comfortable home. I met her at the church and soon came to like her. I visited her home and we wrote to each other."

"Last April I left Titusville quietly and went to Cleveland, Ohio. A week later she joined me, and we went to Elgin, Ill., where I obtained employment in a publishing house and she worked in a watch manufacturing. Evenings I taught music. We did not live as man and wife. Mrs. Fleming is a good, pure and lovely woman. Eventually I intend to marry Mrs. Fleming if she is willing, but it can't be done now. I know marriage to a divorced woman is self-excommunication from the church, but the ecclesiastical law does not recognize a civil marriage."

"While I was a priest I struggled always with myself to honor the garb and fulfill my duties to the utmost, and I did so, but at times a terrible struggle waged within me. I tried to reconcile myself to the life, but could not. The sacrifice was too great."

"I am still a Catholic, still a priest. I give it up of my own free will and accord. I do not wish to bring any disgrace upon the priesthood or upon the religion, but I believe it nobler to live as one believes than to live against the dictates of one's conscience."

WOMAN FIGHTS MAD BULL.—For half an hour Saturday Mrs. Henry Puller interposed herself between an enraged bull and the prostrate body of her husband, which had been repeatedly butted and gored by the animal. When help came the brave woman was facing the bull, while behind her lay Mr. Puller, barely breathing and unconscious. The Pullers, with their five children, live on a farm, on a mountain five miles north of the village of Chester, N. J. Among their possessions is a big, black, dehorned bull. Mrs. Puller heard the bull bellowing Saturday and at a distance she saw the bull trying to drive the stumps of his horns into her husband's chest. There was no help within hail. Her children were too small to be of any assistance. She sent them to the nearest neighbors and, seizing a pitchfork, ran to the bull. She attacked him in the flank, driving the prongs of the fork fully four inches into his flesh. Still he continued to grind his victim with the broken horn. Mrs. Puller walked around to the animal's head and with strength born of desperation she again and again drove the sharp tines into the bull's hide, the prongs sinking from four to five inches at nearly every drive. Finally the maddened bull drew off and stood at bay. Mrs. Puller sprang in front of her husband, who lay limp and still. She stood there and, with her weapon poised, checked the rushes and vicious attacks of the bull until assistance came, half an hour later. As the bull circled around her, looking for a chance to rush in, she, too, walked about her husband, ever keeping his body behind her and her face and weapon to the bull. She was standing thus when the men summoned by her children arrived. Mr. Puller was removed to the house, badly bruised and torn about the head and shoulders and with several ribs broken. He is in a critical condition.
