DANGER SIGNS IN LUZON.

When the next Filipino insurrection comes—and no man who has passed even a short time in the islands doubts that another upheaval is gathering force—it will have for its active head Senor Gregorio Aglipay, self-styled "Archbishop of the Filipino Independent Church." Such is the opinion of Americans who are on the ground and qualified to interpret the happenings of today. Aglipay is traveling from pueblo to pueblo, addressing ever-increasing crowds of his impressionable countrymen—8,000 in Cavite 10,500 in Manila, many thousands in Rizal, Laguna and neighboring provinces. He is rousing his people to action—action, he says, against the friars whom he would drive from the land; action, say others, against the American authorities who have welcomed to Manila Monsignor Guidi, the Pope's agent to the archbishop. Governor Tait is according Aglipay more and closer attention than the American representative has bestowed on any other Filipino since the occupation. Aglipay's chief lieutenants in the movement, which is spreading like fire in dry nipa, are Aguinaldo and Isobelo de los Reyes. Contemporaneous with the launching of the Filipino Independent Church has come the organization of the liberal party, at the head of which is Don Pedro A. Paterno. The tendency of the two movements is apparently toward coalition. These significant announcements are made in the platform: "Carried by a sweeping movement of the Philippine Society, which will not tolerate the present evils of the provisional government, our destiny again forces us into the current of events as nature has placed us, in the same manner as it has given sap to trees and blood to animals, so that we, the Filipino people, may show that we are able to govern ourselves. We want to implant in the Philippines its own responsible government, directed to form and establish Filipino nationality."

To Harness the Waves.—Atlantic City, N. J., will have cause for joy when Dr. D. K. Bryson, of Pittsburg, completes his invention which is to harness the waves of the ocean and drive dynamo which are to light the streets, hotels and cottages with electricity at a price that will put the gas company and other lighting concerns out of business. He has patented his invention and formed a company with \$1,000,000 capital. The first place for the establishment of a plant for practical purposes is to be at Atlantic City. Besides lighting the houses and streets, Dr. Bryson intends to furnish power to operate the trolley lines of the city and every wheel that turns within its boundaries. He will extend his plant to Pleasantville, Somers Point, along the shore road and through the county. The papers of incorporation have been filed in Dover, Del., and the name of the concern is the American Wave Motor Company. The first demonstrating plant will be installed to light one of the piers. The invention consists of long, huge buoys located out from shore, the first to be anchored in a depth not exceeding eight feet of water. The other buoys will be located at regular intervals. These buoys, according to the plans, by being thrown about by the waves in ordinary weather, will develop 150 horsepower, and when a good sea is on their power of generating will be doubled.

Brought Back to Life.—Dr. Geo. W. Crile, a prominent member of the Cleveland Medical Society, has contributed an article to the current Cleveland Medical Journal announcing that through the use of a fluid called "adrenalin" life can be restored to apparently dead bodies. The article quotes Dr. Crile as follows: "By the combined use of intravenous infusions of adrenalin artificial respiration and rhythmic pressure upon the thorax over the heart animals dead as long as fifteen minutes were restored to life. Animals decapitated were made to live 101 hours." Dr. Crile states that the adrenalin is an extract gotten from the glands directly above the kidneys of animals. It has been used heretofore for increasing blood pressure both in human beings and brutes. The discovery is the result of recent experiments in vivisection by Dr. Crile and other physicians of Cleveland.
