

RAILROAD ACCIDENTS.

The Illinois Central "New Orleans Special," from Memphis for New Orleans, which left Memphis at 12:25 o'clock yesterday morning, was derailed and wrecked by an open switch at a lumber company's side track in the southern part of Memphis. Five of the seven cars were derailed and overturned and the locomotive was smashed. Not a single passenger was injured and none of the train crew was killed outright, although the engineer and fireman were fatally injured and three other members of the train crew were seriously hurt. The switch at the siding was opened, although the switch lamp showed a clear track. It is believed that it was deliberately opened and the lamp set with the white light showing for the purpose of derailing the train. The engine collided with a "cut" of heavily loaded box cars on the side track and the entire forward section of the passenger train left the rails. The mail car was crushed and the combination buffet and baggage coach was cut squarely in half. One of the Pullman sleepers was thrown at right angles to the track, but remained upright. The rear sleepers did not leave the rails, and the occupants escaped with a slight shaking up. There were about sixty-five passengers on the train. The engineer and fireman were caught in the ruins of the engine and were scalded and burned. Both will die. The train is the fastest and handsomest on the southern lines of the Illinois Central. It consisted of a mail coach, combination buffet and baggage coach, with two day coaches and three Pullman sleepers.

The Missouri Pacific passenger train which left Wichita at 9:50 Thursday night for Kansas City was wrecked early yesterday while entering the yards at Gates Center. The engineer and fireman were killed and their bodies buried under the wrecked engine. A coal train which had taken the switch was too long and one car had been left on the main track.

Two Great Northern freights were in collision at Des Lacs, Ward county, N. D. yesterday. Five men were injured, three seriously. The engine set fire to a large elevator, which, with seven freight cars, burned. A snowstorm prevented the engineer seeing the train ahead.

CANNIBALISM.—The steamer *Mio-were*, which arrived at Victoria, B. C. last night, brings news of the murder of several white men by the natives of New Guinea. A drought has been experienced for some time on the island, and it is thought that as a result of the shortage of food the natives have reverted to cannibalism. Murders are reported from several places. One report tells of the killing of two European prospectors, who were eaten by the blacks, and a Dutch constable is reported to have been kidnapped and eaten. Several blacks were also murdered. Many of the natives have no food and are subsisting on roots and herbs. The bark *Inverloch*, bound from Liverpool for Melbourne, has been wrecked off the coast of Victoria and is a total loss. Her crew was saved. The Australian steamer *Sevin*, bound from Avo for Port Adelaide with a cargo of sugar, has been lost on a reef in Torres Straits. The crew reached Perth after being picked up by a coasting vessel. One of the boat's crew was four days at sea. J. Clunie Ross, a school teacher, was badly burned, and Mrs. Newton lost her life at Sydney as a result of their clothing taking fire while acting as Mr. and Mrs. Santa Claus at a Christmas entertainment. Capt. George Brown, of the British ship *Ainsdale*, committed suicide at Sydney on December 27.

KILLED HOUSEKEEPER.—Mrs. Stella Wright, a young woman acting as housekeeper for William F. Lewis, a carpenter, living in Chicago, was killed by Lewis yesterday. The crime, the cause of which is not known, was committed with a hatchet, the head of the woman being cut open. As soon as the killing was reported to the police, they commenced a search for Lewis, who had disappeared. No trace was found of him until last night, when he appeared at his home, where three officers were on guard. He was placed under arrest after a desperate fight. While on the way to the police station he requested one of the officers who was holding his hand to loosen his grasp a little, and as soon as the officer complied Lewis snatched a razor from his pocket and cut his own throat. At midnight he was still alive, but there is no chance of his recovery. Both before and after cutting his own throat he admitted that he killed the woman, and said that he had left letters giving his reasons therefor.


