THE KILLING OF GONZALES.

The killing of Editor N. G. Gonzales by Lieut. Gov. James H. Tillman is not likely, according to popular belief in Columbia, to end in heavy punishment for the slayer. Immediately after the shooting, when it was thought that Mr. Gonzales was fatally injured a general impression was that Tillman would go unharmed. Yesterday the sentiment is growing against Tillman, not so much because of the shooting itself, but because of the manner in which it was done and because of the high official position he held, which ought to have meant his observance of the laws.

There are many persons who are still of the opinion that nothing will be done in the end toward punishing Tillman, and if a wager were made at this time it would generally be long odds that he would go unpunished. A great many seem to think that the first trial, which will take place at any time after April next, will result in a mistrial, or possibly a conviction of manslaughter, and that the case will drag along on appeals until everybody gets sick of it and that in the end Tillman will not be punished.

The trial will, if it takes the ordinary course, take place in Columbia. The first session of the court at which the case could be tried will convene in April, but as a general rule, important murder trials are never held at the first session after the crime is committed, as the counsel for the defense generally finds some reasonable excuse to defer a hearing so as to give public sentiment time in which to cool off. After the first postponement there is likely to be another, and then, when the public demands a trial, a change of venue will possibly be asked, although many seem to think that Tillman will find just as good a jury in Columbia as anywhere else. Richland county juries are not prone to convict white men of murder.

Of course Tillman has friends and a good many staunch advocates. If the element of factional politics does not enter into the case, there is a likelihood of some punishment, but if it can be made to appear that there is any factionalism in it it will be almost out of the question to get a verdict of anything but acquittal.

WILL OPPOSE ROOSEVELT.

The leading republicans of Alabama have determined to oppose the renomination of Roosevelt for President. They have launched a boom for Senator Hanna, which has strong backing. For some time a movement has been on foot to have the State republican convention reconvened for the purpose of reconsidering its action in endorsing Roosevelt for the nomination in 1904. W. J. Davidson, who was the chairman of the convention, has letters from republicans all over the State asking him to reconvene the convention but not until this time has he announced his views. Davidson states that if Mr. Wellman, chairman of the State executive committee, will ask the committee to meet, which he seems disposed to do, that he (Davidson) will send out a call for the State convention to reconvene. Discussing the situation, Davidson says: "Roosevelt has failed absolutely to carry out the policy of McKinley as he promised. I think Mark Hanna is the greatest American statesman, and should be nominated and elected President. Ninety-five per cent. of the republicans of Alabama will not be for him first, last, and all the time if he will agree to run. I know the rank and file of republicans of Alabama will not be for Roosevelt, and it can be safely said that they are ready to rescind their previous action in endorsing Roosevelt and endorsing Hanna."

TRIAL DENOUNCED.

At a large meeting of delegates of the United Irish American societies of New York, presided over by Daniel F. Colahan, last night, resolutions were adopted denouncing the trial and death sentence of Col. Arthur Lynch as a travesty on justice. The resolution says in part: "We desire to express our belief that the British government will not dare to carry out the sentence imposed upon Col. Lynch, and also to point out that the action of an English court, in finding a man who had become in due form a naturalized citizen of another country guilty of treason in England, is unjust, unfair, and a gross violation of all the conditions under which millions of citizens had been added to the population of this country. At this time, when England, for her own selfish purposes, is attempting to conceal her enemy to America under the guise of friendship in order the more thoroughly to avail herself of our strength and power, she endeavors to set aside one of the cardinal principles of our institutions and to take from us one of our greatest sources of our strength. We denounce her action as cowardly, brutal, and tyrannical, and predict that it will only serve to call the attention of the world to the fact that as you cannot change the spots of the leopard, so you cannot make the English government anything but stupid, blood-thirsty, cowardly and cruel."
