**KILLED FATHER AND SON.**—"I'll pay you in lead coin," William King is alleged to have said to James Rogers, near Florence, S. C., yesterday, when Rogers asked remuneration for taking care of King's setter dog which had strayed and been taken up by him. He drew his pistol and fired. According to the story told by eye-witnesses, Sam, the eighteen-year-old son, ran up at this moment and said: "If you shoot pa, you will have to shoot me too." King turned the pistol on the boy and one bullet killed him instantly. Then he fired three more shots into the father's back, completing the deadly work. Mrs. Rogers cried out: "You have killed my baby." "I'll kill the whole family," said King, pulling the barrel of the pistol in her face and pulling the trigger. The weapon was empty. King then went off. He told his wife to notify the sheriff that he would not be taken. The Rogers are poor people. King is of the country-storekeeper class. He seemed to have thought that Rogers intended stealing his dog. They cared for the animal when it came to their house, and as soon as they ascertained the owner, notified King. The story of the killing is given by several eye-witnesses.

**BLIZZARD IN THE WEST.**—One of the worst blizzards in recent years has been raging in Chicago since early yesterday morning, and has caused much damage to telephone and telegraph wires. The storm commenced with a fall of rain which later changed to snow, and last night has changed back to rain. The storm has been accompanied by a gale of forty-eight miles an hour. Many persons have been badly injured by falls, the pavements being a sheet of ice. A blizzard is raging throughout eastern and southern Wisconsin. The snow is drifting badly. Railroad trains and street car traffic are considerably hampered. Rain, hail, and snow prevailed in the last twelve hours over Missouri, with thunderstorms in Missouri, central Kansas, Arkansas, and Oklahoma. In western Missouri the rain turned to sleet, damaging wires to a greater or less extent, but causing no serious trouble. All trains in and out of Kansas City were delayed slightly.

**BITTEN BY MAD DOG AND CAT.**—Charles Ryman, a farmer living at St. Lukes, six miles from Woodstock, Va., that place yesterday morning for the Baltimore Pasteur institute to be treated for possible hydrophobia. He had with him his three-year-old son and eighteen months-old daughter. Ryan was bitten nine days ago by his dog, and the children were bitten on Sunday by a pet cat. Eighteen hogs, two horses, and a cow and her calf, and the cat have developed symptoms of hydrophobia. The dog was at large two days before he was killed, and it is not known how much additional damage has been inflicted. There is great excitement in the neighborhood, and any suspicious looking domestic animal will pay the penalty on the spot.


**WIFE MURDER AND SUICIDE.**—Banks Miller, a young white man of Winston-Salem, N. C., shot his wife last night and then killed himself. Miller and his wife had a dispute Monday and decided to separate. She left her husband, taking their two children to the home of relatives. Last night Miller called to see his wife, and after talking over their misunderstanding the wife consented to live with her husband again. As he started to leave the room, he asked her to come to the door and kiss him good night. She complied with the request. Miller immediately thereafter turned around and fired at his wife. The husband then placed the pistol to his head and fired. When the officers arrived at the house, Miller and his wife were lying on the floor dead. There were two eye-witnesses to the tragedy.

**WOMEN AND CHILDREN PERISH.**—In a fire which broke out on Malcolm Island, some distance up the coast from Vancouver, in a common living house, where 24 families lived, 11 women and children were burned to death and 17 other people were injured Thursday evening last. There was no water supply and the crowd which gathered around the blazing building could do little but watch the women and children burn to death. Several children were thrown from the house at their feet, and a number of women leaped from the second story of the doomed hotel, receiving severe injuries. There were about a hundred families on the island. The building was put up to provide temporary shelter for the more recent arrivals, who had been living in tents.

**ONE HUNDRED AND EIGHTEEN YEARS OLD.**—Charles Moten, colored, doubtless the oldest resident of Washington, died at the home of his daughter, 2111 E street northwest, Washington, at 6 o'clock last evening, at the extreme
