A PROTEST.

The following protest will explain itself:
As Alumni of the University of Virginia the undersigned respectfully but earnestly protest against the passage of the "Bill to incorporate the General Alumni Association of the University of Virginia, with authority to issue certificates of membership to local associations and individuals composing said General Alumni Association," for the following among other reasons:

1. That the charter of the Society of Alumni, has adopted February 5, 1873, did not provide for or contemplate its own dissolution and merger in the summary and inconsiderate manner in which these objects were sought to be accomplished at the small meeting of Alumni on June 17, 1902; and the legality of said action may well be questioned.
2. That the said meeting, at which the so called merger was declared was not sufficiently representative to warrant action, which, we believe, does not reflect the sentiment of the great body of the Alumni.
3. That the adoption of a new constitution of such radical character without previous notice to, or consideration by, any of the local associations, or of a considerable number of Alumni, was unseemly and utterly at variance with established usage in such cases, and the election of officers for two years, under a constitution so adopted, was in violation of good taste and the rights of the Alumni generally throughout the country.

4. That the principle of central power as opposed to individual action is contrary to all Virginia traditions, and especially to the teachings of Jefferson.
5. That the local associations are entirely shorn of their power, dignity and independence, and, as a consequence, will be shorn of their interest—the power being given, in section 9 of said bill, to the general association to admit or reject members of the local associations. Individual alumni are to have no standing at all except such as may be conceded by the general association. There is an undue concentration of power in the executive head of said association which may become dangerous and offensive.

6. That local associations are competent to decide who shall be their members without interference by the executive committee of the general association.
7. That alumni of the university (whether members of local associations or not) are entitled to a standing as such—the records of the institution affording the necessary proof of their credentials, without the need of certificates signed by the president and secretary of said general alumni association.
8. That while each member of a local association and each individual alumni must pay an initiation fee and an annual capitation tax he does not become a member of the general association unless in the former case he is elected a delegate and, in the latter, unless he proves that he does not belong to a local association, or does not live within a convenient distance to the place where one exists.

9. That there is no check in the constitution or proposed bill of incorporation upon the running expenses of the general association, nor any provision for a bond to secure the safe custody of its funds.
10. That there is no good and sufficient reason why the President of this or any other association should be the head of its executive committee to hand the entire management of its affairs is committed.



HEARST BOOM.
A presidential boom in behalf of Wm. R. Hearst and a bitter attack on deserters from the democratic party by William J. Bryan were the dominating notes at the barbecue given in Columbus, O., last night by the Jefferson-Jackson-Lincoln League, organized a year ago by former Congressman John J. Lentz and others. Twelve hundred people, men and women, were present. The programme of toasts follows: Toastmaster's address of welcome, John J. Lentz; address "Local Self-government for Cities," Mayor Tom L. Johnson, of Cleveland; address, "The Plain People and their Champions," ex-Governor James H. Eads, of California; address, "The Te of Democracy," Col. W. J. Bryan, of Nebraska. Clarence S. Darrow, leading counsel for the United Mine Workers, who was to have responded to the toast, "The Industrial Slave," telegraphed during the day that he would be unable to be present. The invocation was pronounced by Rev. Herbert S. Bigelow, the Cincinnati clergyman who made an unsuccessful campaign for Secretary of State on the democratic ticket last fall. W. R. Hearst, who had been invited to address the banquet, sent his regrets in a telegram.
