FIRE IN CIRCUS QUARTERS.

Fire partly destroyed the new brick car barn at the winter quarters of the Barnum & Bailey Circus in Bridgeport, Conn., yesterday, and burned a number of cars belonging to the circus. The loss is estimated at \$100,000, on which there is an insurance of \$33,000. The fire was caused by a lamp falling to the floor in the midst of a quantity of benzine and other inflammable material. While the fire was at its height a cornice fell, carrying to the ground with it 12 firemen who were at work on the roof. The men were considerably bruised, but were not otherwise injured. Considerable excitement was occasioned during the removal of 14 elephants, which were quartered in a building adjoining the car barn. It was necessary to remove the elephants through a door facing the burning building and across the tracks between rows of burning and smoking cars. In order to accomplish this safely the four keepers took one animal out at a time, until the entire herd was removed. The loud trumpeting of the elephants gave rise to a rumor that the animals had broken loose. This rumor rapidly spread around the city and occasioned much alarm. The other animals, however, were at no time in danger. The fire was under control in about half an hour. Six new Pullman cars, valued at \$13,000 each, and two new flat cars, valued at \$4,000, were entirely destroyed. More than 150 feet of the barn was burned to the ground, and 10 stock cars which were standing outside the barn were considerably damaged.

LAW OFFICERS DEFILED.

United States Marshal D. W. Cunningham, of Hinton, W. Va., on Monday went to Atkinville, in Raleigh county, near Beckley, the county seat of that county, to serve attachments on thirty miners for the violation of Judge Keller's injunction while the strike was in progress last summer. Cunningham was accompanied by three other deputy marshals, but this small force was greatly outnumbered by the crowd which met them and resisted the arrest of the men wanted. When Cunningham and his party arrived at Atkinville they found themselves surrounded by about 250 miners and sympathizers armed with Winchester and shot guns, who defied the officers to lay hands on one of the men for whom writs had been issued. Under the circumstances Cunningham thought it best not try to execute the writs, but instead, he went to Hinton to await instructions from his superior officers as to what method to pursue in the matter. It is understood that lawlessness reigns supreme at Atkinville. It is said that one day last week the sheriff of the county went to that point to serve a warrant and was roughly handled and not allowed to serve the warrant.

GUARDIAN CARIBBEAN SEA.

President Roosevelt has signed the agreement drawn under the terms of the Platt amendment providing for the acquisition by the United States of a naval station at Guantanamo and a coaling station at Bahia Honda, both in Cuba. The document had been previously signed by President Palma and was brought to Washington by Minister Squiers. It does not specify the price of the properties to be acquired by the United States, and the detail is left to be settled by the usual legal condemnation proceedings, after the navy department has decided exactly the amount of land it wishes at each place. With these two places properly fortified as naval bases the Gulf of Mexico would not be possible of occupation by a hostile fleet and the Caribbean Sea would be unsafe for an enemy. As the names of the places indicate Guantanamo, a naval station will be the more important of the two bases, and within a short time there will be erected extensive coal docks and perhaps a short line of railroad will connect the port with the backbone railroad already finished by private enterprise. Bahia Honda will for some time probably be used simply as a place for the storage of coal.

AMERICAN DANCER IN BERLIN.

Isadora Duncan, the California dancer, has been supplied with \$250,000 by subscriptions from her admirers in Berlin with which to build a theatre to be called by her name. Externally it will be in the style of a Greek temple and the interior will be Grecian. The theatre will be devoted occasionally to Miss Duncan's dancing and at other times to the production of Greek plays and to concerts. The dancing of Miss Duncan has so attracted the Berlin public that the prices charged for admission to her performances are as high as those of Coquelin and Mme. Bernhardt. The academicians have arranged for reduced prices to art students. Herr von Werner, president of the Berlin Artists' Society, has written a letter refusing to accept such privileges and alleging that he is not willing to "encourage immorality." Countess von Buelow, wife of the Imperial Chancellor, and Countess von Thiele-Winckler, wife of one of the leading financiers of Germany, are among Miss Duncan's patrons.
